Arrest Awaits Four of Gang In Lynch Case

First Man Seized Makes Confession

Jackson, N. C., May 27—(UP)—Local authorities tonight said they were preparing to arrest four men as members of an armed white mob that seized Negro Godwin "Buddy" Bush from the jail here early Friday.

Confession Made

Solicitor Ernest Tyler says the arrests will be made on the basis of a confession to the F.B.I. by one of the members of the would-be lynch mob. He said the names of the men would not be revealed until the arrests are made.

F.B.I. Chief J. Edgar Hoover says the man who confessed to taking part in the attempted lynching of the 24-year-old Negro also named seven other white men as members of the mob. Hoover says he has turned the confession over to North Carolina authorities because no violation of federal law is involved. Tyler says the men will be prosecuted for kidnapping which carries a mandatory life sentence in North Carolina.

Mrs. Martha Truman Rallies Once More

Grandview, Mo., May 27—(UP)—Latest reports indicate that Mrs. Martha Truman has rallied again after her overnight slump. The 94-year-old lady spent an up-and-down day, but in the afternoon, she began once again to show signs of improvement. The President says she slept comfortably and is holding her own. However, he is not too optimistic about the doctor's report of improvement.

Gas, Electric Labor Call Off Walk-Out

Paris, May 27—(UP)—Eighty-five thousand Parisian gas and electric workers, threatened with arrest and prison terms, have called off their scheduled strike. In an attempt to thwart the walkout threat, the government had invoked drastic measures, including seizure of the plants and the drafting of the workers into the army.

University Receives \$105,000 Endowments

Announced at the board of trustees meeting in Raleigh yesterday were two endowments to the University totaling \$105,000. Largest of the two sums was a gift of \$80,000 presented by Ralph C. Price and Mrs. Joseph M. Bryan in memory of their father Julian Price, late president of the Jefferson Standard Life Insurance company of Greensboro. The money is to be used to establish the Julian Price professorship in Life Insurance in the commerce school here.

From the estate of the late O. Max Gardner, former governor of the state and Ambassador to the court of Saint James at the time of his death, came another \$25,000 to set up a yearly award to the faculty member who makes the greatest contribution to the welfare of the state.

President Frank Graham, Controller W. D. Carmichael, Jr., Business Manager C. E. Teague, and Miss Billie Curtis, Secretary of the board of trustees attended the meeting from the University.

Trustees Pass New Regulations On Local Traffic

The Board of Trustees meeting in Raleigh yesterday passed in toto a 14-page recommendation of traffic regulation of traffic regulations to be applied to the three campuses of the Greater University.

The new regulations, which will become effective here during the summer outline parking areas and rules, set speed limits and provide a one-dollar fine for all violations.

In addition the regulations require registration of all student-owned automobiles with the University, and use of special identification plates to be issued by the University.

The traffic recommendations affecting Chapel Hill were drawn up and submitted to the trustees by a committee composed of Duke Wilder, chairman, Clifford Pace of the Institute of Government, J. B. Linker of the faculty, and J. A. Williams of the business office.

Students will have an opportunity today to help determine the efficiency of departmental instruction in a poll to be conducted by a committee appointed by Student Body President Tom Eller from 8 o'clock this morning until 6 o'clock this evening, Eller announced last night.

Members of a faculty committee have expressed their deep concern in learning the student's reaction on the quality of instruction in the University, and for this reason the poll is being taken. They are anxious to get the student's "honest and fair" judgment, and it is therefore very necessary that every student vote for the success of this experiment.

Polling will be done in four centrally located places on campus. Graham Memorial and the 'Y' will be open from 8 to 6 for voting. Lenoir dining hall and the Carolina inn cafeteria will be open for voting during meal hours.

Officers Picked For Legislature In Final Session

After a minor fight over one of President Tom Eller's appointments to the Dance committee had been ironed out, the Student Legislature in their final session of the year last night, proceeded to nod their approval of the remainder of the executive nominees, and to elect officers of the Legislature for the term.

Party Line

The verbal fracas was over the appointment of Tom Lockhart to the Dance committee. Despite the vigorous words of the president of the student body in defense of Lockhart, the legislature, voting down a party line, rejected the appointment by a vote of 16-15. Observers noted that the majority of the dissenting vote came from the Student party.

Neither was the party line spurned in the election of legislature officers as the Student party ran off with all but one of the posts. Charlie Long, SP candidate for vice-president in the recent elections, was named speaker pro-tem by the assembly, defeating Tag Montague by 17-15.

Peter Gerns was elected to the office of Parliamentarian. Gerns received 16 votes to 14 cast for his opponent Ben Wood.

By a vote of 17-11, Basil Sherill won the position of chairman of the Powerful Ways and Means committee from veteran legislator Ernie House.

Miles Smith was chosen head of the Elections committee, winning over Bob Collins, former chairman, of the Rules committee.

To succeed Collins the assembly chose Herman Baker by a 17-13 count. He defeated Steve Nimocks.

Bill Mackie was re-elected to the chairmanship of the Finance committee. Charlie Norton was the losing candidate.

The final election of the session was that of legislature representative to the Graham Memorial board of Directors. Tag Montague, present chairman of that panel, was elected to retain that position.

Former Democratic Vice President May Present Informal Address Here

Henry Wallace, the jumping bean in the Democrats political basket, will be in Chapel Hill on June 5 where he is expected to give an informal address in Hill hall.

The former vice president, who is an ardent foe of the Truman Doctrine, a get tough policy toward seats of Communism, is booked for a speech in Raleigh that evening. His subject is to be "The Road to Peace."

Once a champion of the liberals, later discounted as a political corpse, Wallace has been stumping the country lately, has surprised political observers by attracting vast crowds.

As a result, an Associated Press story recently reported that Wallace begins to loom as a definitely possible running mate with President Truman in 1948.

Information that the Democratic politico, who has riled President Truman and South Carolina's former Secretary of State Jimmy Byrnes, will speak here was released by Miss Mary Price, executive secretary of the Southern Conference of Human Welfare.

In Hill Hall Talk

Dr. Graham to Stress Need For Federal Education Aid

Dr. Frank P. Graham, president of the Greater University of North Carolina, will stress the need for federal aid to education in an open address tomorrow evening at 8:30 in Hill hall. The speech is being sponsored by 16 campus organizations, headed by Dr. Graham, while not pushing either one of the two important education bills now before Congress, will discuss each one.

The two bills involved are the Taft bill, S.472, and the Aiken bill, S.199. Both bills are before the upper house, providing for almost the same thing, with the main exception that S.472, sponsored by Senator Taft and seven colleagues, schedules no federal control of allotted funds, while S.199, introduced by Senator Aiken, has a certain degree of federal influence on fund expenditures, which is apparently not desired by influential people of the southern states.

The 15 organizations sponsoring President Graham's talk, besides the Students for Democratic Action, are the AVC, Coed Senate, CPU, CRIL, Di, Grail, IRC, Phi Delta Kappa, Phi, SCHW, UVA, Valkyries, UWA, YWCA, and YMCA.

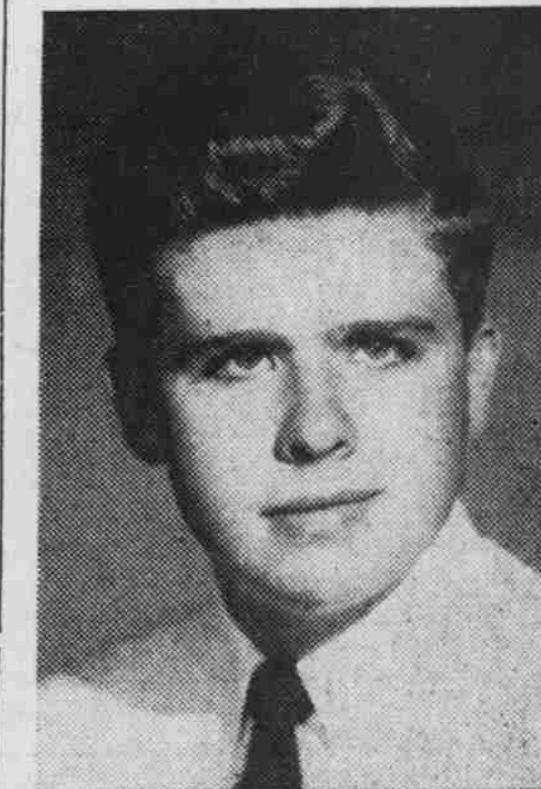
Margaret Goodman was elected treasurer, while Gilbert "Bugs" Burnett, Student Legislature member, was re-elected business manager and treasurer.
