## GEOGRAPHERS MEET

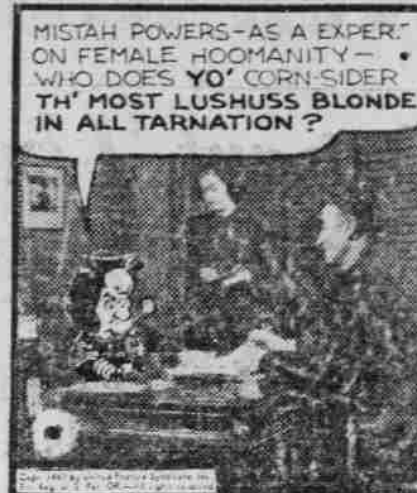
