Election Rules

Its second proposal includes rules by which an election should be declared void or null. Elections to pick either student government executives or campus editors shall be invalid, according to the bill, unless one half of the eligible voters go to the polls. In the case of inadequate voting on the original ballots, subsequent elections and, if necessary, appointment by the Dean of Students are provided.
