The Communication Center of the University of North Carolina has been placed in charge of public relations for the North Carolina Division of the American Cancer Society, Mrs. George E. Marshall, vice-president of the Center, announced today.

The public relations program was approved last week when representatives of the Cancer Society met in conference with Mrs. Marshall.

"The new program will include utilization of newspapers, magazines, radio programs, motion pictures, and other public relations methods," Mrs. Marshall said, "and it will mean that greater emphasis will be placed on work done in North Carolina to fight cancer."

Jane Grills and Robert Schenkan of the Communication Center Radio Division will direct the program, and Edward Freed of the Motion Picture Division will assist. Walter Spearman of the journalism department of the University will act as press consultant.

Back during the gay 80's Major William Cain, head of the University math department, rented the second floor of the Palace and oftentimes played his violin in the late hours of night. Cain met his death accidentally in front of his home on the day of a football game in 1930. Since that time residents of the village declare they have heard violin strains while passing the house at night.

For the next few years after 1930 the Palace was used as a rooming house for truck drivers, as a bicycle repair shop on the side of the house and as a shoe fixery at the rear of the place. In 1937 the Summerlins moved in and converted the house into a real home. For several years they were bothered daily by room-seeking truck drivers and other persons in need of shoe and bicycle repair.

Sheriff Says Kids Grabbed Log Cabin

Des Moines, Ia. Oct. 1.—(UP)—Sheriff Howard C. Reppert disclosed tonight that 30 boys and girls used his own secluded log cabin for all-night parties without his knowledge.

He said that the mother of one girl in the group has filed statutory rape charges against two youths, 18 and 20. He said five youths have pleaded guilty to delinquency charges sentences.

The cabin had been presumed vacant since the death of a caretaker three weeks ago. Reppert visited it and discovered the clues which led him to round up the youngsters.

Three of the girls are being held at a juvenile home, he said, and six others have been released in the custody of their parents.

Reppert said the five boys who were sentenced ranged in age from 15 to 20 years.
