You can imagine the impact with which this great expose struck my trusting nature. It was horrible! I thought of suicide. Only my cowardly lack of courage saved me from taking the "easy way out."

I am even now beseiged by conflicting doubts. Capitalism still has certain attractions for me. Being a college boy, I figure I shouldn't fare too badly in the awful "dog-eat-dog system" of the status quo. But, on the other hand, if I had some assurance of being among the more-equal-than-others cla-oops! - I mean group, then, I'd be willing to abandon capitalism altogether in favor of a class-less society.

But how can I be sure that I'll be among the "more equal" class in such a class-less society? That is my dilemma. Can you tell me, Bill? Or, should I sharpen my teeth and prepare to eat some dogs?
