Sewage Disposal Worker Burned In \$1,000 Blaze

Duke Hospital Says Condition 'Satisfactory'

R. B. Noah, 40, of Mt. Airy, was reported in "satisfactory" condition at Duke hospital last night after he received first and second degree burns in a fire which completely destroyed workmen's living quarters at the University sewage disposal plant site.

Town Manager Gilbert Ray estimated damages at \$500 to \$1,000, not including personal effects of the occupants of the building, which was owned by the Boyd and Goforth construction co.

The fire broke out at 8:30 last night when a coal stove exploded after Noah had poured kerosene on the coals to produce more heat. J. P. Martin and John Atwell received only superficial burns putting out the flames which enveloped Noah.
