### Touring 'Hamlet' Show To Be Here January 17

#### Stores to Close Both Holidays

Stores of Chapel Hill and Carrboro will be closed Christmas and New Year's days, it was decided at a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Chapel Hill-Carrboro Merchants Association Saturday morning.

According to Vic Huggins, president of the association, some merchants have decided to remain closed December 27. This date, however, is optional.

The Margaret Webster Shakespeare company will present "Hamlet" here in Memorial Hall on Jan. 17, under the sponsorship of the Carolina Playmakers. The company, which is on a seven months' tour, opened in Buffalo, Sept. 26, where during a week's stay, it presented its premieres of "Hamlet" and "Macbeth."

Tickets for the production are priced at \$3.30, \$2.20, and \$1.10, and are available at the Playmaker business office in Swain hall. All seats are to be reserved. The appearance of the Margaret Webster Shakespeare company is a milestone in theatrical "road" history because it is the first Broadway-standard repertory to barnstorm the nation's colleges, universities and public auditoriums. Miss Webster's New York production of the Bard have set a mark which, Drama Critic John Mason Brown declared, "not one has surpassed or in any way approached."

Abetting Miss Webster is a company of 22 young actors, veterans of her many presentations, headed by Carol Goodner, Joseph Holland and Alfred Ryder. Miss Goodner is well remembered for her more recent roles in "The Man Who Came to Dinner," "Blithe Spirit" and "Deep Are The Roots." Mr. Holland last appeared on Broadway with Katharine Cornell in "Antony and Cleopatra." Last season, Mr. Ryder sandwiched Ibsen's "Ghosts" with Eva LeGallienne between movies for Paramount.

The Webster productions of "Hamlet" and "Macbeth" were designed by Wolfgang Roth, and the music arranged by Lehman Engel.

Rebelling over the countryside in specially constructed bus and truck, complete with scenery, costumes, props and electrical equipment, "Shakespeare On Wheels" will cover over 40,000 miles by the end of its tour, which was arranged by S. Hurok and the National Concert and Artists Corporation.

And when she's 75, it's downright "cruel."

A United Press correspondent assigned to write a biography of Mrs. Post called her today and asked the date of her birth, which is omitted even in "Who's Who."

"It's cruel to drag it in," Mrs. Post protested. "It's October 27, 1873. But I never mention it if I can help it. It seems to be an anchor around my neck that I can't get away from. Seems the older I get the more interested people get in my age. Now if I were approaching 100 . . . Where is this coming to be printed?"

"It's for our files," the correspondent answered.

"Oh, an obituary," Mrs. Post exclaimed. "Well, if they're not going to print it until I'm dead I don't care."

### Fraternity House Discussion Group To Hold Meeting Tomorrow at YMCA

Gene Turner, representative from Phi Delta Theta fraternity, announced yesterday that there will be an organizational meeting of all fraternity presidents and their representatives in the new House Discussion group tomorrow at 2 o'clock in the Y.

The House Discussion group started as an experiment on the part of four fraternities to encourage better relationship between themselves, between the faculty and the fraternities, and to promote better knowledge of the issues confronting the nation and the world today.

"So far the Delta Kappa Epsilon, Delta Psi, Sigma Chi and Phi Delta Theta fraternities have achieved excellent results in our experiment," said Turner.

The participating members of the House Discussion group select their own speakers and topic and with the cooperation of the Y planning board they initiate the programs. The future plan of this organization is to correlate the sororities and the dormitory

groups into a unified discussion group. "We hope that we can contribute to the growing cohesiveness between dormitory men and fraternity men by such a plan," said Turner.

At present the group has invited members of sororities to their meetings, and has extended invitations to all interested members of the student body whenever the fraternities hold such a round-table meeting.

The new group has received "enthusiastic support" from the members of the faculty and administration. The mass meeting scheduled for Thursday at 2 o'clock is for the purpose of presenting the successful experiment to the other fraternity groups.

(Continued from page five) Weiner broke into college ball with a bang, scoring a touchdown against VPI on his first play in 1942. In 1947 Weiner caught 19 passes for 396 yards and ran ten end-arounds for 35 more yards. This year he scored six touchdowns, caught 31 passes for 468 yards, and carried the ball on end-around plays on seven occasions for a gain of 47 yards and an average of 6.8 yards per rush.

Weiner joins George Barclay, Andy Bershak, Paul Severin, and Charlie Justice as the only All-American gridgers in the history of the University. He is the third Tar Heel end to gain the honor. Bershak and Severin were the other flankers given All-American laurels.
