### Swain Addresses YWCA Cabinet; Is Awarded Gift

Continuing a series of talks based on C. S. Lewis' book, "Christian Behavior," Mrs. Cattie Swain, formerly assistant to the director of personnel, spoke to the YWCA cabinet Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock in the Y office.

Mrs. Swain discussed the four cardinal virtues: prudence, temperance, fortitude, and justice.

The Y cabinet presented Mrs. Swain, former advisory board member, with a gift in appreciation for her cooperation with the group in the past.

Miss Rosalie Oakes, secretary of the southern region of the national student YWCA, outlined to the cabinet a set of four commissions recently formed jointly by the YW-YMCA of the Southern region.

"Understanding Christian Faith, Churchmanship, and the World Mission of the Church" is the first of these commissions and is being set up in the Raleigh area.

about 3 per day, figured from 53 patients being released from the first through the 15th of January. According to Randolph this average will not keep up.

"There should be around 250 to 300 cases in hospitals by the first of April," he said. "These will be the long run cases and will be slower in dropping out."

Randolph said that even though the epidemic is declared over, in the end it will cost more money for the follow-up, carry through job, than has been spent on taking care of the acute cases.

"The organization and plans for the follow-up have been set up and put into effect by the Crippled Children's Service of the state Health department. We still are helping a number of cases from the 1944 epidemic."

Of the 2509 cases reported, 142 deaths have been listed. This goes a little over the usual 5 per cent in a polio epidemic.

Cost for hospitalization for the calendar year of 1945 amounted to more than \$600 per patient. Which figured at the \$400,000 that North Carolina had on hand when the epidemic started would have taken care of only about 666 cases.

untouched. According to population Moore county was one of the hardest hit. With a population of only 30,969, it had 67 cases. Guilford county, with a population of 153,916, had 249 cases. A smaller number proportionally than Moore.

The epidemic reached its worst stages in July when the 864 cases were reported. With only 54 cases reported from January through April the epidemic seemed to gather momentum as it raced through the hot summer months, and decline as fall ran into winter. In May 75 cases were reported, 294 in June, 697 in August, 341 in September, 137 in October, 31 in November and 13 in December.
