It Doesn't Pay To Park In A Judge's Driveway

Pearl Norwood, local Negro woman, found out Tuesday morning in the Chapel Hill Recorder's court that parking a car in a driveway is bad business, especially if the driveway enters into the home of the Recorder's court judge.

Pearl, who was charged with blocking Judge Henry Whitfield's driveway, declared she had parked outside the driveway when she went to work at the Carolina Inn. She said she had taken extreme care not to park in the driveway, and that someone had moved her car there while she was at work.

However, police officer R. L. Blackwood testified that her car was squarely in the center of Judge Whitfield's drive when he investigated the situation. Judge Whitfield fined Pearl \$10 and costs. She immediately appealed, and her bond was set at \$100.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26 (UP)—The Senate Banking committee today unanimously approved a GOP-sponsored program for voluntary rationing of scarce materials. The program, due to expire Feb. 28 unless continued, gives the government power to make voluntary agreements with producers to assure key industries a supply of scarce items, such as steel.

Chairman Burnet R. Maybank, (R-C.) said he will ask the Senate to approve the extension tomorrow. He must get unanimous consent for immediate action.

Health Group To Give Course In Parenthood

Mrs. Edith Brocker, supervising nurse of the District Health department announced yesterday that the department, beginning next Monday at 3 o'clock, will present an eight-week pre-parenthood course as a free service to the community in order to instruct expectant parents in the various phases of pregnancy and infant care.

Miss Dorothy Lunsford, district public health nurse, will teach the classes, which will last from 3 to 4 o'clock each Monday afternoon. They will be held in the District Health department offices on old Fraternity Row. Movies, demonstrations, lectures, and discussions will be included in the course.

The schedule includes such topics as hygiene and nutrition of pregnancy; labor and hospital procedures; and habit training. All interested persons are invited to enroll at the first meeting on Monday.
