WASHINGTON, May 19-(UP) -Congress was told today that Communist Hans Freistadt's atomic fellowship will be with-

May Sue

Hans Freistadt said yesterday that he will "consult legal advisers" about the possibility of bringing a damage suit against the government if his Atomic Energy Commission fellowship is withdrawn.

The 23-year-old Austrianborn youth, an admitted Communist, said the letter he received from the National Research Council notifying him of his appointment as a fellow "stated that when I had written a letter of acceptance, it would constitute a contract."

He said he had written the letter of acceptance and had received an acknowledgement. Informed of Dr. Detlev W. Bronk's statement that the council might dig up private funds to make up for the fellowship, Freistadt said:

"I would be grateful for that alternative. But I still believe that there are not adequate grounds for cancelling the original fellowship.".
