

# Tar Heel Cagers Head For Miami

## Seat Allotment Planned For Duke, State Cage Frays

Vernon Crook of the Carolina Athletic Department announced yesterday that a system of splitting the student body in half will be put into effect for the N. C. State basketball game on January 21 and the Duke game on February 17, in order that everyone may get to see at least one of these contests. Both games are scheduled for Woollen Gym.

The fact that there are more students and University employees holding athletic passbooks than there are seats in Woollen necessitated this plan. Students and employees possess approximately 10,000 passbooks, while the maximum seating capacity of the gymnasium is about 5,000.

To avoid an overcrowded situation for these two games, all seats will be reserved and the following procedure will be used:

1. Holders of passbooks bearing serial numbers with odd last digits, that is, 1, 3, 5, etc., will have a priority on seats for the game with State on January 21.

2. Individuals who wish to see this game and have odd numbered books must exchange coupons for tickets at the ticket office window in Woollen Gym on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, January 16, 17, and 18, between 9 a. m. and 5 p. m.

3. On Thursday and Friday, January 19 and 20, if there are any tickets left after the above priority period, they will be issued on the basis of a first come, first served basis to holders of passbooks bearing even serial numbers—or to anyone with a passbook.

4. Any space that is not called for by Friday afternoon by 5 p. m. cannot be claimed by holders of passbooks and will be sold to the general public, beginning Saturday morning at 9 o'clock.

5. When two members of the same family have passbooks, with one carrying an even number and the other an odd number, these individuals will be permitted to secure seats for the same game, but the serial number of the book issued to the head of the family will determine the game to which they can be admitted.

A similar procedure will be in effect for the Duke game on Feb. 17, but the priority on this game will be offered to book holders who have even serial numbers.

## Platoons Retained

NEW YORK, Jan. 11—(P)—College football coaches voted today to keep the two-platoon system and made a concession to the smaller schools by liberalizing the free substitution rule.

In an all day session, the coaches rules committee recommended retention of the controversial free substitution standard which permits the deploying of full 11-man teams as units.

They went further and recommended that each team be allowed to substitute one man after each down without incurring a penalty.

At present a team is penalized five yards for making a substitution when the clock is running.

Lou Little, chairman of the committee, said this is designed to help those teams unable to enter into platoon football.

## Squad Hopes For Victory In Florida

Carrying a regular season record of four wins and four losses with them, the Tar Heel Cagers leave tonight from the Raleigh-Durham Airport for Miami, Florida. The Cagers, who have been on the road for the last three games, engage Miami University in games Friday and Saturday nights in the famous resort town.

The team will be out to regain their winning form which was slightly hampered in the rout at Lexington, Kentucky Tuesday night. Adolph Rupp's Kentucky Wildcats, currently ranked second in the nation, ran away with the game 83-44. But it is not all discouragement for Carolina.

"Red" Bennett stood out in the Kentucky game when he hit for 11 points, and although he was bottled up by the Wildcats, Nemo Nearman has percentage riding with him as he attempts to break loose again so he did in the early part of the season.

Another encouraging factor for the Tar Heels is the successful return of Guard Charlie Long. John Tsantes is still playing regular despite his broken nose.

After the Miami games the squad will return to play Wake Forest in Big Four competition on Monday night Jan. 16. This game will be the sixth and last on the present road trip. Wednesday night Jan. 20, South Carolina moves in to open a five game home stand which will have as its feature game Jan. 20, State College.

This home stand will be the first chance Chapel Hill followers have had to see the basketball team since the start of winter quarter.

## Rough Competition Set For Tar Heel Tracksters

Coach Dale Ranson will get a good chance to size up some of his defending Southern Conference indoor track champions Saturday night when eleven of his top men compete in the Washington (D.C.) Evening Star-District of Columbia AAU Indoor Track Meet in the Washington National Guard Armory.

Competing in the meet for Carolina will be two conference champions, Sam Magill in the two-mile event and Jack Moody, 1948 high jumper, in that event. Bob Morrow, who was second in the conference high hurdles last winter, will compete in the 70-yard highs.

All three will be in for some stiff competition. Such men, as Irish Olympic star Jack Berry of Villanova and Curtis Stone of the Penn Athletic Club are considered to be two of the nation's top two-milers and they will both be on hand in Washington.

Another Olympic man, Illinois' Dike Eddleman; former Star champion Dave Albritton and many other of the nation's top high jumpers will answer the call in the nation's capitol.

Morrow, likewise will find the going tough. The hurdle event is always a tough one in Washington, but Morrow ran there last year and fared well.

There will be a special mile relay event for Southern Conference schools. Carolina, a close third in Washington last year, will have to beat out Maryland and Duke, one-two last year, in order to win that event.

Carolina's quartet will consist of Gene Brigham, Percy Flowers, Clarence McLain and Bill Crimmins. With the exception of Brigham, a sophomore, this is the same team which competed last season.

# Buckeyes To Send Strong Soph Aggregation Against Tar Heels

Local swimming fans will get an opportunity seldom had in these parts to see some of the best mermen in the nation perform when the Ohio State Buckeyes invade Bowman Gray Pool for a clash with the Tar Heels Saturday afternoon.

Coach Mike Peppe's aggregation long has vied with Michigan for domination of the Big Ten Conference and for the past ten years have been constantly among the top three teams in the nation. Last year they visited Chapel Hill for the first time and walked off with top honors in the NCAA championships.

This year, however, the Ohio State team will be without the services of famed Bill Smith, national record holder in the 220 and 440-yard freestyle events and an Olympic champion. Another top member of last year's championship team who was lost through graduation is Halo Hirose, sprinter.

But according to the rumors coming out of Columbus, these and many other losses haven't affected the Buckeyes too much. They have come up with an extremely strong squad of Sophomores and are said to be even more powerful than last year.

Diver Bruce Harlan is perhaps the most outstanding member of coach Peppe's team. Fans here will remember him for his performance last spring when he won both the high and low board competition in the Nationals and also for his comely act on the diving board. Harlan is also the Olympic springboard champion and holds various AAU titles.

Another champion familiar to Chapel Hill is Bob DeGroot, who barely nosed out Carolina's Jimmy Thomas to cop the national title in the 150-yard backstroke. Although his name was not among those sent to coach Dick Jamerson, it is very likely that DeGroot will provide the chief competition in that event. Two other topnotch backstrokers are sophomores Joe Prata and Jim Sonner.

Elsewhere in the Sophomore ranks are such nationally recognized talents as those of Jack Taylor, both a distanceman and a backstroke. Taylor beat Yale's fabulous Jimmy McClane in the 1500 meter swim in an outdoor AAU meet two summers ago.

Then there's Jose Balmoris who has performed in many national meets as a freestyler, backstroke and breaststroker. He is slated to swim the breaststroke leg of the medley relay Saturday and also the 200-yard breaststroke.

Frank Dooley and a lad named Kobayashi comprise the sprinters for Ohio State. Both have turned in times of 51 seconds for the 100. Joe Marino is sensational as a Sophomore diver while Bartell and Stephenson add depth to the breaststroke and State, he broke the national freestyle ranks respectively.

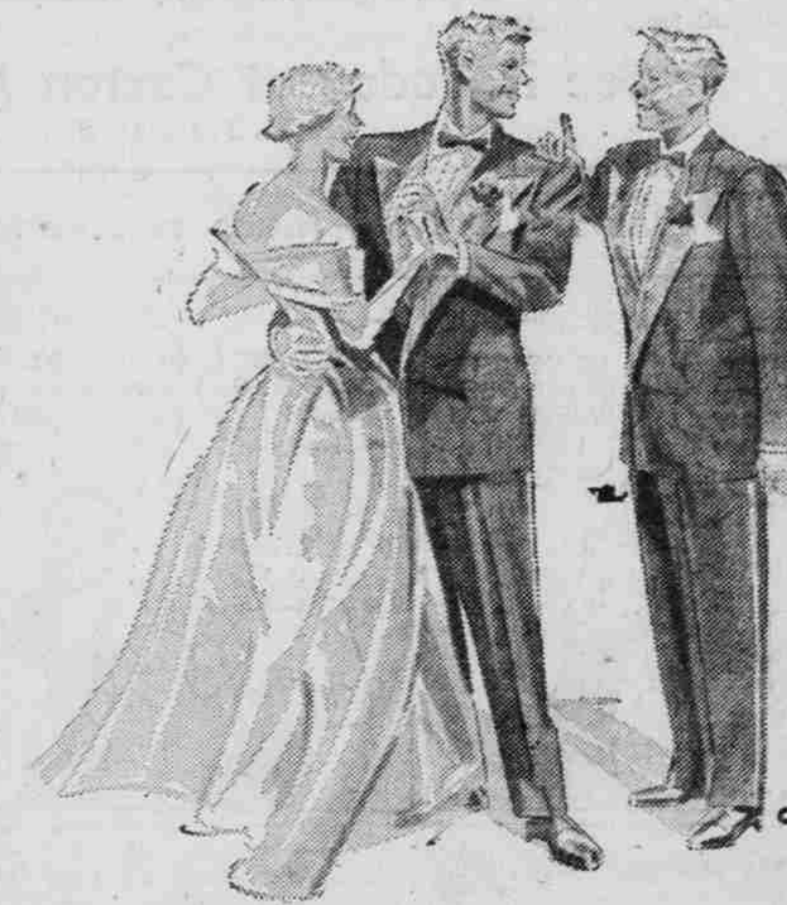
