

Three New Schools Given Go Ahead In Other Action

O. Max Gardner, Jr., University law student from Shelby, was named to the Executive Committee of the Greater University Board of Trustees by the Board at its meeting here yester-

In other action, the Board approved three new schools for the University. The new units will be a School of Journalism, replacing the department; a School of Social Work, replacing the department, and the School of Commerce will become the School of Business Administra-

Gardner's appointment is to fill the position of the late Governor Ehringhaus. Gardner has been serving as a member of the president to succeed Dr. Frank

Gardner will run for the State Senate from Shelby in the next primary.

Carolina Grad New GU Head; Here By Sept.

Twin City Native Unanimously OK'ed At Morehead Meet

Gordon Gray, Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the University in 1930, was brought back to his alma mater shortly after 11 o'clock yesterday morning as the full Board of Trustees unanimously voted him president of the Greater University of North Carolina. Secretary of the Army Gray was voted to succeed Senator Frank Porter Graham as Presi-

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6-(A) -Gordon Gray is quitting as Secretary of the Army to take over the presidency of the Greater University of North Carolina. He set a deadline of Sept. 1 for the move.

Gray made known his decision today shortly after trustees of the University elected him to the presidency.

In a statement, Gray said that he would be available for the new job "no later than Sept. 1 and as soon before that date as the requirements of the Department of Defense permit."
