Document Is OK'd By Voting Margin Of 686 Ballots

Despite opposition from factions of the Town Men's and Town Girls' Association, the revised Student Constitution passed in Tuesday's General Election by a 686-vote margin, Elections Board Chairman Jim Gwynn revealed yesterday.
