

Baseballers Dump Mountaineers; Track Team Downs Tigers

West Virginia Protests Tilt In 2nd Inning

In a game played under protest, after the second inning, Carolina's Tar Heel baseballers marched to a 11-2 triumph over West Virginia's Mountaineers on Emerson field yesterday afternoon.

Southpaw Bill McGinn won the distance for the home out, giving up 8 scattered hits to the opposition while fanning a like number. He also accounted for 2 of Carolina's 9 hits with a triple and a single and scored two runs himself, driving in a third.

West Virginia protested the error in the second inning when plate umpire Kasey charged Mountaineer hurler Dick Morgan with a balk and advanced one Tar Heel run across the plate.

The Tar Heels scored most of their runs in the third and seventh innings.

The third frame opened with Will Hobbs getting to first on an error by second baseman Dick Morton of West Virginia. Two successive walks to third sacker John Senter and second baseman Skeet Hesser loaded the bases.

Joe Brookshire banged a single into center field to score two while Hobbs came in on a wild pitch by Morgan. Brookshire scored on a long out by Jim Ballou to give the Tar Heels 4 tallies.

The Mountaineers sent a new man to the mound with one out in the inning, Art Donata who went for 4 2-3 innings before he was relieved in the eighth by Ted Topper.

The home team scored 3 more in the seventh on two straight safeties by McGinn and Johnnie Clements, who came in for Joe Eldridge in center field in the eighth.

Tomorrow afternoon the Carolina baseball team will open Big Four play against Duke University here at Emerson Stadium. The Easter Monday Duke-Carolina game will be the first of five contests between the two institutions.

Dean Cassell will probably start on the mound for Carolina.

Albans, Scott Morrow Shine In Dual Meet

Three meet records, including a University record by Bill Albans in the broad jump, high-lighted the annual Carolina-Princeton dual track meet which the Tar Heels swept easily, 77 1-3 to 53 2-3.

Albans took time off from spring football practice to turn in a leap of 24 feet, 9 7-8 inches to break the old record of 23 feet, 7 3-4 inches set by Hubbard and Higby in 1935. He also won the discus with a toss of 130 feet, 2 in.

Bob Kirk, Carolina's star javelin tosser, and Princeton's mile relay team also set meet records. Kirk threw the spear 197 feet, 2 1-2 inches to better his own mark of 195 feet, 8 1-2 inches, set last year.

The Tiger relay team of Jim Sparkman, Jerry Bentley, Bob Eby, and Sam Howell ran the distance in 3:26 to break the old record of 3:36.9 set by Princeton last year.

Carolina, which had been running nip-and-tuck with Princeton all the way, was disqualified when anchor man Gene Brigham ran out of the baton passing zone while making an exchange with Clarence McLain.

The Tar Heels showed strength down the line as they took nine firsts and a tie for first to put the meet away early in the afternoon. Only in the middle distances did Carolina prove unable to keep pace with Princeton.

The highly anticipated personal dual in the two mile between Sam Magill of Carolina and Tiger Dick Snedeker turned out to be a walk-away as the Tar Heel ace won by fifty yards doing the distance in the good time of 9:44.5. Snedeker, who defeated Magill earlier in the season, might have been tired by the mile which he won in 4:27.3 to get the Tigers off to a good start in the running events.

The bespectacled Morrow won both the low and high hurdles without being threatened. Morrow lead Tar Heels Garrett Fitzgibbons and Jim Woolcott across the finish line in the low hurdles in the time of 25.7 seconds. He topped the highs in 15.4.
