Gray Honored At Retirement Fete In Capitol

WASHINGTON, April 11-Tar Heel Gordon Gray, who will retire as Secretary of the Army Wednesday, was bonored at a military review and reception here today.

Gray leaves his post to take over the presidency of the University of North Carolina. He is relieved by former Budget Director Frank Pace. Pace's appointment by President Truman was unanimously, approved by the Senate yesterday afternoon.

Pace is scheduled to be sworn in tomorrow morning at 10:30 in the office of the Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson.




