

State Wins Big 4 Sports Carnival, 20-19, Edging Blue Devils

Wolfpack Win Its First; Carolina 4th

Carolina's mural teams came up with a complete reversal yesterday afternoon at Raleigh, by placing fourth in the Big 4 Sports Day Carnival, a point behind Wake Forest and six points behind the Meet's winner, State. Carolina had won the championship twice in a row up to this year.

State won three events to top Duke in a close race for the championship, edging the Blue Devils by one marker, 20-19. Winning for the first time since the Carnival was organized, the Wolfpack won the softball, horseshoes, and table tennis events and outshined the rest of the Mural champs who were close on the heels of State, but couldn't take enough places. Duke placed first in the tennis match, while Wake Forest won in the volleyball and golf contests.

Playing two rounds for each event, the teams were in nip and tuck contests all the way down the line, from softball to golf.

Carolina was unable to place first in any event, but garnered a second place in the horseshoe rounds. Ed Cloyd and Joe Curtis starred for the Tar Heels throwing many ringers and winning their matches.

In the leadoff softball game Carolina went into extra innings before bowing to Duke, 3-2. Choo Regan went all the way pitching a good game, but not getting the breaks. In the consolation game, the Tar Heels walloped Wake Forest, 7-2. The Blue and White softball team failed to capture the softball trophy by not winning the third leg. The Tar Heel Mural teams had won the softball championship in the last two Big 4 Carnival Days. Duke and State have one leg apiece on the trophy.

In the volleyball contest, Carolina lost to Wake Forest and the Deacs went on to whip Duke and become strong contenders in the early part of the day. Although Carolina lost in yesterday's Big 4 Day, they still retain a 3-1 record in the annual series. Duke has won once and State now has a win in the annual affair. The team score: State—20; Duke—19; Wake Forest—14; UNC—13.

H. Alexander Will Captain Tennis Team

Heath Alexander, senior from Charlotte, has been elected captain of the 1951 Carolina tennis team. He succeeds Clark Taylor of New Haven, Conn., Southern Conference singles runner-up.

Alexander played number three for the Tar Heels this season and won 18 of 23 singles matches. In the conference tournament he was eliminated in the third round by second seeded Howie Atwater of William and Mary.

Wake Forest Frosh Defeat Tar Babies Fifth Time, 5-1

WAKE FOREST, May 18—For the second straight time within as many days and for the fifth time this season the Wake Forest freshman slapped down the Tar Baby nine in defeating the visiting Carolina team, 5-1, in Wake Forest this afternoon.

Hard luck Bill Lore pitched for the Tar Babies—only to lose his fourth ball game.

Carolina bats were dulled all afternoon by Bud Woodclief—salvaging only three hits—one of them good enough for a run. With two out in the sixth inning Bob Henning, Carolina's first baseman, knocked a triple into deep right field and ran it out for a triple. Henning, then, with a count of two and one on the batter, stole home for the only run, avoiding the second straight shutout by the Wake Forest Deaclets at the expense of the Carolina freshmen. Carolina had been scoreless in 15 straight innings against the Baby Deacs.

Wake Forest banged out nine hits against Lore—one of them a homerun by Jack Wehner in the seventh inning. Carolina meets the Duke freshmen in Durham Saturday in the next to last game of the season. This game will decide the season series between Duke and Carolina.

GREENSBORO, N. C., May 18 —(AP)—Dick Savitt of Cornell, seeded first, and Tony Vincent of Miami, ranked second, breezed through two victories each here today to make the round of 16 in the fourth annual Sedgefield Inn Tennis Championships.

Savitt, in nation's 16th ranking amateur, stopped the University of North Carolina's Don Skakle, 6-2, 6-4, then proceeded to stop Randall Jarrell of Greensboro, 6-1, 6-2.

Vincent was pushed hard to beat John Curtis of Washington, D. C., in a morning match, the score reading finally 7-5, 8-6, but in his afternoon second rounder he easily bounced Hugh Bowman of North Carolina U., 6-0, 6-0.

One upset marked today's play. Fred McNair, a former No. 1 varsity man at Cornell and now a resident of Washington, D. C., upset seventh-seeded Buddy Ager of Chapel Hill, N. C., 6-0, 4-6, 8-6.

Field Events To Open 26th Annual Meet

Trials for the 26th running of the annual Southern Conference Outdoor Track Meet begins here this afternoon on Fetzer Field when 221 athletes from 13 schools compete in the biggest meet of the year.

There will be trials for all the running events except the mile and two-mile and all the field events save the pole vault and high jump with the top six men qualifying for the finals tomorrow. The trials begin at 3 o'clock.

Carolina, winner of the meet for the past three years, will be the heavy favorite to win with Maryland, Duke, VPI, and N. C. State counted on to round out the top five. Clemson, Davidson, Richmond, South Carolina, VMI, Wake Forest, Washington and Lee, and William and Mary fill out the field.

Last year the Tar Heels came out on top with 75 points followed by Duke with 47½, Maryland 45, and VPI 22. This year there is a fair chance that the team will break their own record for points scored, bettering the 83 they rolled up in 1948.

The competition is expected to be unusually tough this year with a strong likelihood that the big field will produce several new records. Paring down the field will require as many as (See TRACK, page 4)

Although the Tar Heels have been able to win only three out of eight games so far, they have shown some good play at times and have demonstrated their ability to provide good competition for such powerhouse teams as Virginia, W&L, and Washington College.

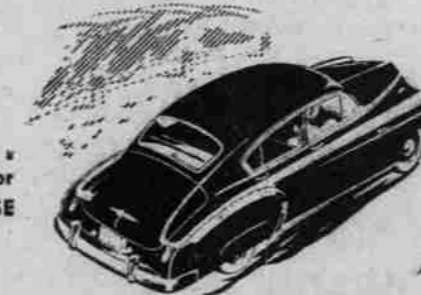
