## You May Be Younger Than You Think, Says Ga. Prof.

ATHENS, Ga., Oct. 19—(AP)—If you're over 40 you may be younger than you think. In fact, you may be 80 and still as young as your 35-year-old neighbor.

At least, that's what Dr. A. S. Edwards, head of the Psychology Department of the University of Georgia, says.

Birthdays have relatively little meaning, Edwards declares in the current Journal of Applied Psychology. His article is based on extensive experiments on hundreds of persons from 16 to 90.

He terms body, hand, and arm steadiness an important key to ability. People who have normal control over their movements often are capable of doing skilled work regardless of age, Edwards contends.

In the experiments he divided subjects into three groups: 1. College age (16 to 35); 2. Senescents, people between 60 and 85 who are in good health; and 3. Senesiles and older people (84 to 90) who are physically or mentally unwell.

His findings showed that senescents had little more finger tre-

more than the college students and in many cases were steadier than the younger group.

Among senesiles, however, finger tremor increased an average of 300 per cent.
