

Tar Heel Quint Wins Over Hanes Hosiery By 75-58 Score

Fast Breaks Dominant In Easy Win

WINSTON-SALEM, Dec. 5.—Fast breaks with plenty of action dominated the Tar Heel cagers' third game tonight as they defeated the strong Hanes Hosiery semi-pro team, 75-58. The UNC quintet was in control of the game almost all the way, gaining a 21-18 lead in the opening minutes and remaining ahead for the remainder of the game.

Co-Captain Hugo Kappler and Howard Deasy led the scoring for the Tar Heels with 18 points each. Sophomore Jack Wallace also played an outstanding floor game, netting a total of 10 points. Sub Vincent Grimaldi saw a fair share of action and was good for 9 points.

Center Hugo Hampton and Guard Dave Greer paced the Hanes Hosiery five ably, but were unable to hold down the smooth working Tar Heels.

Fouls were fairly plentiful throughout the game and big Howard Deasy had to leave the game in the last half because of an excessive number of violations.

Coach Tom Scott substituted freely throughout the second half, and every man on the Tar Heel bench saw action.

AP Sportswriter Tabs N.C. State No. 1 Team In Nation; Anderson Fears Rating

RALEIGH, Dec. 5.—(AP)—If the long-suffering basketball opponents of North Carolina State needed any additional incentive to knock the Wolfpack from its lofty perch, it was furnished today in New York by Associated Press Sportswriter Joe Reichler. Joe peered into his crystal ball and found that State would be the No. 1 basketball team in the nation this season. He wrote that State "is loaded," adding that "All-America Sam Ranzino and four other key lettermen, bolstered by the addition from the school's brilliant freshman team, gives Everett Case the strongest team he has had in four years despite the loss of the fiery Dick Dickey."

In the absence of Coach Everett Case, his assistant, Carl (Butter) Anderson, had this to say: "It's nice to know we are so highly thought-of and we'll do our best to uphold the rating, but it's really too early in the season to know just which teams are the best."

"I've seen Kansas State and Long Island play in New York and both look good. Each section of the country has teams capable of ranking around the top."

"We think we'll be good, but so much depends on the sophomores. You never know about sophomores in advance. We'll have more height than ever before which should help us to control the backboards and Sammy Ranzino is as good as ever on offense and is playing better defensive ball, too."

"There are a lot of things to be done yet before we get our team set. We've tried certain stuff against Furman and Loyola in winning our first two games and will continue to experiment when able until we feel we are set."

"Center Paul Horvath, spurred

on by the competition of tall boys, is really hustling to hold his job. "Junior Bob Cook and Sophomores Bobby Speight, Eddie Morris and Bernie Yurin have looked promising so far and the other boys are not far behind them."

Holdash, Hansen, Bunting Work Out With All-Star

WAKE FOREST, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Wake Forest Football Coach Peabody Walker introduced his version of the T-formation today to a group of Southern Conference All-Stars.

Walker and Art Guepe of Virginia are coaching an all-star squad which will play the Richmond Rebels of the American Association at Richmond in a charity game Sunday.

Working out under Walker's eye were Duke's Mike Souchak at end and Billy Cox in the backfield. North Carolina's Center Irv Holdash, Tackle Roscoe Hansen, and Back Dick Bunting; N. C. State Center John Martin; and three Wake Forest stars. The latter included Tackle Jim Staton and Backs Carroll Blackerby and Bob Jones.

Walker expects more all-stars to show up for practice tomorrow.

UNCMatmen Open Season January 18

Athletic Director R. A. (Coach Bob) Fetzer yesterday released Carolina's eight-match 1951 wrestling schedule which opens with a meet against Virginia Military Institute here Jan. 13.

In all there are four home matches. Other teams visiting Carolina are all Southern Conference foes, Davidson, Maryland and defending conference champion Washington and Lee. The featured intercollegiate match for the Tar Heels has been scheduled with the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis Jan. 27. Navy and W. & L. are the only newcomers.

The Tar Heels will begin the season without the services of ace grapplers, Oscar Gupton and Phil Kemp. Kemp, a two-time Southern Conference champion in the 157-lb. class, recently went on active duty with the Air Force. Gupton graduated last year.

Sam Barnes, who replaced the retired Chuck Quinlan recently, will begin his first year as coach of the Tar Heels. Barnes was formerly wrestling coach at VMI. The schedule:

Carolina Swimmers Open Season Today With Dual Meet At Duke Indoor Pool

The Carolina swimming team will open the 13th season today against the Duke swimmers at 4 o'clock in Duke Indoor Pool.

Coach Dick Jamerson's boys will go into the meet with a record of 45 straight Southern Conference victories. Duke was the last to beat them, winning in 1939. In addition, Carolina has a 78-12 record for the 12 years since the team has been organized.

The Tar Heels will start an all sophomore lineup of Buddy Baarcke, Barry Wall, and Stan Tinkham in the 300-yard medley relay.

Captain Jimmy Thomas and Cecil Milton compete in the 220-yard freestyle against Duke's Mellon, one of the better swimmers in the conference. Rick Levy and Kirby Ambler swim against conference champ, Bill Brackney in the 100-yard freestyle.

Another conference champ from Duke, John Connor, will dive against Reggie White and Bill McCord. Buddy Heins and Kent Williamson meet Brackney again in the 100-yard freestyle where he is also conference title holder.
