Dr. Sommer said, "Miss Lehrbecher had been very despondent recently. She liked Chapel Hill and the friendliness of everybody she met, but could not overcome her homesickness."

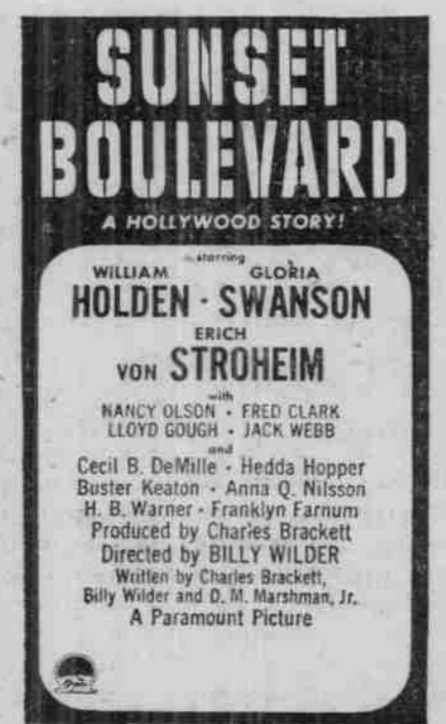
