 To: Residents of the Men's Dorms

 Subject: Conduct in the Dorms

It has been brought to our attention that there is a general lack of observance of the social rules governing the occupants of the Men's Dorms. With this in mind I would like to point out the rules now in existence and ask your co-operation in abiding by them. There is a councilor on each floor for the purpose of maintaining order and quiet. However, the Judiciary Board feels that it is to the best interests of all concerned to observe the rules voluntarily.

Quiet hours are from 7:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. each day. This means that there will be no loud noises, such as loud talking, yelling, radio with volume too loud, or any other noises which will in any way disturb the quiet in the dorms. This time is set aside for study and sleep, neither of which can be carried out effectively in a noisy place.

Guns, firecrackers or any form of firearms will not be permitted in the dorms. The safety of the residents is in jeopardy when these things are present. Also, the laws of North Carolina are very explicit as to the use of firecrackers and the Board of Trustees is opposed to the presence of firearms in the dorms. Violators of this rule will be dealt with to the fullest extent of the law.

Each resident of the dorms is responsible for the equipment placed at his disposal and any damaged property will be charged to the occupants of the room in question until actual responsibility is determined. This equipment is for your benefit and should be treated in the

same manner you treat your personal property.

It is our sincere wish that we will not be required to take stern measures in enforcing these simple rules. You, the occupants of the respective dorms, and you alone, will be the deciding factor in whether or not your dorms is the best place on campus to live.

United, we will have quiet dorms; divided, we can only hope for the best and expect the worst.

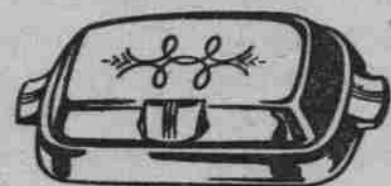
