'Christmas Carol' Show To Be Presented Sunday

A two-fold program for the children of Orange country during the Christmas season will be the reading by Samuel Selden, director of the Carolina Playmakers, of Dickens' famed "Christmas Carol," and a collection for the Orange Country Empty Stocking Fund in the Playmakers Theatre at 8 o'clock.

Preceding Professor Selden's traditional reading of the beloved Christmas story, members of the Empty Stocking Fund Committee, headed by Mrs. Henry Clark, Jr., will collect donations of money,

clothing, food and toys for distribution among children in this county on Christmas day.

Professor Selden's reading, edited into four staves, will be the 34th renewal of a cherished event at the University. The late Dr. Frederick H. Koch, founder of the Playmakers, initiated the seasonal program, and gave a total of 278 readings of Dickens' story in many sections of the country, appearing four times in Town Hall in New York. Professor Selden is continuing the series.

The Empty Stocking Fund is a Junior Service League project, and was inaugurated in Orange county last year to provide needy children with Christmas gifts. Donations amount to more than \$1,000 in value were collected last year, and Mrs. Clark's committee

Governor Scott To Attend Highway Safety Meet Here

A special highway safety meeting of state recorders' and mayors' court judges, solicitors, sheriffs, and police will be held in Chapel Hill Dec. 14 it was announced by Commissioner L. C. Rosser.

Governor Scott and Supreme Court Justice W. A. Devin will attend the meeting, which will begin at 10:30 a.m. in the Institute of Government building. The enforcement and judicial officials will cooperate in formulating plans to cut down the toll of highway accidents which have already claimed 930 lives since January.

Commissioner Rosser said that suggestions from the group of officials that have been asked to attend would be especially pertinent to the problem at hand since they have jurisdiction over the violation of Motor Vehicle Laws.

In a letter urging attendance of the safety meeting, Governor Scott asked that the group consider "... all ways of tightening up law-enforcing procedures and bringing about the highest possible degree of cooperation between police, prosecutors and judges in going as far as effective law enforcement can go in safe guarding the lives and property of people on the streets and highways of North Carolina."

Gordon Gray, president of the Consolidated University, will be back full-time starting January 1. Active with the job of organizing the Psychological Strategy Board since June, Gray has worked in Chapel Hill about two days a week since he was appointed to the government post by President Truman.

Gray Back For Good Unless Army Calls Him

Dr. Raymond B. Allen, president of the University of Washington, will take over the job in January. Gray will be available as a consultant for Allen's benefit.

Allen has a great interest in psychological warfare problems and is finishing his other governmental duties quickly to assume the new post by New Year's.

When Gray was granted the part-time leave of absence by the trustees in June, he told them that "nothing short of the President's calling me back in the Army as a captain, which he has the power to do, could force me to leave the University permanently."

Gray has served as secretary of the Army, special presidential aide, and now is chairman of the National Commission on Financing of Hospital Care, but the job does not interfere with his University work.

Grad Gets FBI Award

Edward Scheidt, UNC graduate and special agent in charge of the New York FBI office, was the recipient of honors recently when associates and members of the Federal Court in New York acknowledged the completion of his 20 years of service in FBI.

The ceremonies consisted of a mock trial, attended by 700 persons who overflowed a courtroom in the United States Court House at Foley Square, N. Y.

Scheidt was found "guilty" in mock trial proceedings of "twenty years of loyalty and devoted service." He received the Bureau's 20-year service award, a silver key, and a set of luggage from members of the New York office which he has headed for six years.
