Gray Chooses Nine For Hospital Group

administrative aspects of hospital care financing have been appointed to advise the National Commission on Financing of Hospital Care in the selection and development of its research projects.

It was announced here yesterday by Gordon Gray, commission chairman and president of the University.

The commission, an independent agency financed by \$500,000 in grants from several foundations, was established "to study the costs of providing adequate hospital services and to determine the best systems of payment for such services."

The new technical advisory committee had its first meeting March 21 and 22 in Philadelphia. Chairman Gray said it reviewed the findings of regional conferences sponsored recently by the commission "to determine dayby-day problems that are crippling efforts to provide high quality hospital care for all segments of the population."

He said leading representatives of consumer as well as professional groups attended the regional conferences. After reviewing the problems presented by these groups, he said the technical advisory committee will formulate recommendations for study projects it believes the commission should undertake.

The commission, Chairman Gray continued, plans to appoint other special advisory committees and panels of consultants as specific research projects are developed. He said the following persons have accepted appointment to the Commission's technical advisory committee:
