Milner Will Speak Prof's Meeting

"New Tools for Learning" will be the topic for the April meeting of the Chapel Hill chapter of the American Association of University Professors this evening at 7:30 in the faculty lounge of the Morehead building.

Charles Milner, associate director of the University Extension Division and head of the Bureau of Visual Education, will discuss the latest techniques and equipment in visual aids for teaching. He will also show a new film entitled "New Tools for Learning" and demonstrate the use of the overhead projector for classroom use.

Walter Spearman, president of the chapter, said the program had been arranged by the executive committee as part of its plan to encourage the improvement of teaching methods at the university level. Milner has had a wide background of experience in the use of visual aids and believes that they provide an effective method of making teaching more interesting to students.

Young Paschallians

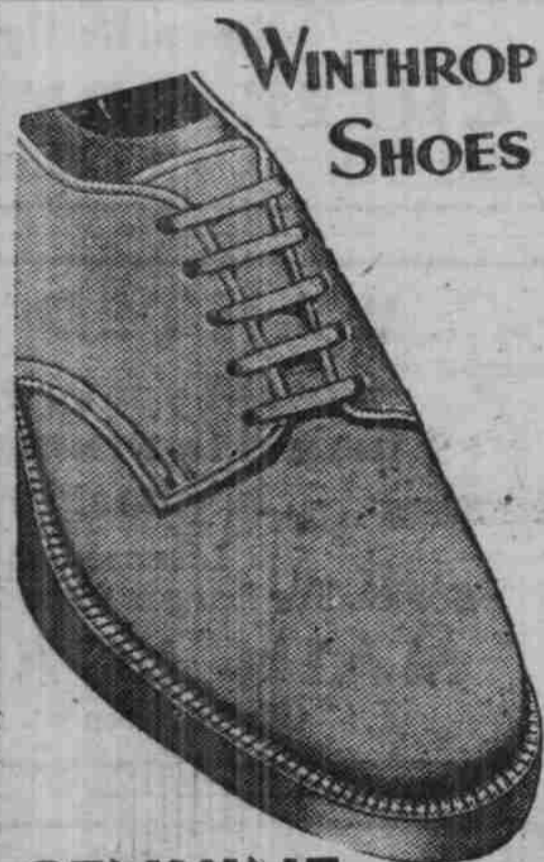
Dr. William Poteat of the philosophy department will meet with the Young Paschallians at 4:30 p.m. today in the Episcopal parish house.
