
## To Begin On Sept. 18 Bond Plan Initiated

The University is cooperating with the Treasury Department in adopting a payroll-savings for bonds plan, Chancellor Robert B. House said yesterday.


Each employee in the University is eligible to participate by signing a payroll deduction authorization and all employees will be solicited for the purpose of joining the bond plan. An employee may designate any amount, not less than \$1.25 per pay, as his deduction for bond purchases. An employee may change the amount of his deduction at any time and shall have the right to withdraw from the plan at any time. All expenses coincident to solicitation and administration of the bond plan will be paid by the University.

The purpose of the bond plan is to encourage our University employees to save a small portion of their earnings for themselves, to provide for our employees a method of preparing for future expenditure such as childrens education, vacation or sickness and to provide a safe investment in America, House said.

The bonds pay three per cent interest compounded semi-annually and the bond will be mailed to your home by the issuing bank in approximately 10 days.
