Scholarships Are Listed By 2 Groups

Announcement was made yesterday of two scholarship funds open to interested students.

Eastman Kodak Co. will award 19 fellowships, each providing \$1,400 plus an allowance for tuition and fees, during the school year 1952-53. Twelve of the fellowships are in chemistry, four in chemical engineering and three in physics.

They are offered to 18 U.S. institutions, including the University of North Carolina, which will select a research student in the last year of study for his doctorate. Basis of selection will be the student's demonstrated ability in his major, a high degree of technical promise, soundness and financial need.


The awards, open to seniors and graduates, are for one year of foreign study and include transportation, tuition, books, and maintenance for the academic year.


