Boyd's Speech Will End Relations Meet Tonight

Dr. William M. Boyd, Negro professor in the Department of Political Science at Atlanta University, will highlight the four-day Human Relations Institute here by giving two talks and leading a discussion this afternoon and tonight.

Dr. Boyd's first talk will come at 4 p. m. today in Gerrard Hall. At this meeting the topic of his discussion will be "Looking Back—Race Relations in the South During the Past 20 Years."

Ten Students In New York For UN Meet

Ten students left yesterday for New York and the United Nations Seminar, which is being sponsored by the National YMCA and YWCA.

The three day seminar will be climaxed by a dinner, at which Dr. Frank Graham, former president of the University who is now working with the United Nations, will speak.

The seminar, which will be conducted Thursday through Saturday, will be attended by 200 students from all parts of the United States, and is designed to afford the students with an understanding and working knowledge of the UN and its functions.

The agenda includes visiting with the representatives of the United States Mission; attending UN sessions; meeting with representatives from France, India, Pakistan, Egypt, Israel, and Indonesia; and sight seeing.

Wiley Will Give Lecture Today On Old France

Dr. William L. Wiley, Professor of French, will deliver an informal Bull's Head Bookshop tea lecture this afternoon, speaking on his new Harvard Press book, "The Gentleman of Renaissance France."

This book is based on Dr. Wiley's extensive research in France during 1948-9, when he visited noted scholars, authors, and historians, and investigated the famous French chateaux.

Dealing with Renaissance concepts of gentility and nobility as reflected in the customs and life of the court, his book is intended to be both scholarly and light enough for popular consumption.

Dr. Wiley, a native of Georgia, was graduated from Chattanooga College and received Master's and Doctor's degrees from Harvard. He first came to Carolina in 1925 for a three-year term as French instructor, after which he joined the Harvard faculty.

AFROTC Holds Review For Visiting Inspector

The University's Air Force ROTC Corps of Cadets will hold a formal review at 12 o'clock today on New Emerson Field in honor of a visiting party representing the Commandant, Air Force ROTC, who has headquarters in Montgomery, Ala.

The drill squadron will also give a short demonstration for the official delegation, headed by Col. Axel E. Althberg, assisted by Lt. Col. Harley N. Cox and Major Eugene W. Kennedy.

Col. George J. Smith, professor of air science and tactics, announced that the review is open to the public, and bleacher seats will be available.

Today's review is part of the annual Federal inspection of the University's Air Force ROTC. The Commandant's representatives inspected academic and administrative activities of the Department of Air Science and Tactics Wednesday, and will conclude their visit today.

YWCA Run-Off Will Be Held Tuesday Night

Misses Dottie Figel, Anne Huffman To Vie For Prexy Of Group

Dottie Figel and Anne Huffman will compete in a run-off election for YWCA president on Tuesday when run-offs will be necessary for the five other major Y offices also.

Results of Tuesday night's balloting in women's dormitories and sorority houses qualified the following candidates for run-offs:

Sonia Bergan will oppose Carol DuPler for the vice-presidency, while Elsie Peterson and Ann Jones will run in the secretarial race. Candidates for the treasurer's post will be Jackie Steed and Allene Nash.

Competing for the two remaining offices will be Louise Coffey and Ann May, membership chairman; and Jody Derry and Bobbie Walker, program chairman.

Run-off voting will be held in the residence halls on Tuesday night, as was the preliminary election.

Prexy Gorham Gets Response To Evaluation

President Bob Gorham said yesterday that at this early stage, response to the faculty evaluation has been very good.

Members of the evaluation committee urged all town students who have not picked up sheets to do so. These sheets can be obtained from the Y or the Graham Memorial Information Booth before 3 p. m. today.

Dormitory students who did not receive sheets should also check by the Y or GM.

The committee members feel that every undergraduate should have a chance to rate his instructors, and emphasized the fact that the sheets must be picked up, filled out, and returned before 3 p. m. today.

Charles Kuralt Favors UNC Sports Program

Charles Kuralt, Daily Tar Heel editorial candidate, yesterday stated his position on sports "positively and emphatically," saying: "I am in favor of Carolina's sports program."

Explaining his sports stand, Kuralt declared he favored "athletic scholarships, given, as they are, through the University." He said he also favored "complete student, faculty, administration, alumni, and general public support for all Carolina athletics."

Kuralt continued, "I want Carolina to win in sports... everything in which we participate." He pointed out that he favors "increased sports coverage" of the "whole realm of Carolina athletics," and intends to "work diligently for such coverage if elected editor."

"Since there is a difference in being sports editor and being editor, I feel the scope of The Daily Tar Heel editor's knowledge should extend beyond sports alone."

"An understanding and sympathy for the cause of all students in all groups is required of a good editor. He must not hold obligations to any one segment of student life; he must be fair to all," he added.

"This is my position; this is where I make my stand," Kuralt concluded. "Sports is a great part of the student newspaper. There is more: Good news coverage and a lively editorial page. I hope to give the students a fair, and what is more, a complete Daily Tar Heel."

Kuralt is opposed by Tom Peacock, independent candidate for the editorship.

Orientation

HENRY LOWET in political row

Lowet Replies To Statements Of Candidates

Student Party Chairman Henry Lowet yesterday told University Party floorleader Bob Farrell and independent editorial candidate Tom Peacock to mind their ethics.

Lowet, in a prepared statement, said that "Mr. Farrell stepped downward and lost sight of ethical standards as he rebuked the SP." (Farrell assailed the SP this week, charging that it "hasn't done anything but spend money.")

Lowet cited Peacock, who is running for Daily Tar Heel editor, as an example of one who forgets "the higher standards of integrity and propriety" necessary to "command the respect of the student body."

"Strangely enough," Lowet said, "Mr. Farrell and the entire UP membership in the student Legislature voted in favor of the social improvements plan for Victory Village and the dorms. Yet, Mr. Farrell charges that the appropriations were not passed in good faith."

(Farrell said SP forces in Legislature supported the dorm and Victory Village appropriations for political reasons.)

Referring to Peacock, Lowet said the editorial candidate criticized "the 'pseudo-professional politicians that run' campus politics."

Jimmy Adams Resigns Post To Assist Creasy

Jimmy Adams has resigned from the Student Council to be campaign manager for University Party presidential nominee Tom Creasy.

In a letter to President Bob Gorham released yesterday, Adams said he would quit his post on the Student Council "to help serve student government in a different way, that of personal campaign manager for Tom Creasy."

Commenting on Adams' appointment, Creasy said, "It is a pleasure... to appoint him (Adams) at this time as my personal campaign manager. Adams and I have

agreed that, as far as we are concerned, if we keep this campaign clean, then we will come out ahead, win, lose, or draw."

Adams had only two weeks more to serve on the Student Council. He said in view of this and "to preserve the impartiality of the Student Council" he would resign. "It is my belief that anything that I could do to aid in the election of Tom Creasy as president of the student body would be time well spent in what I am confident would represent the best interest of the University and the students," Adams stated.

YMCA Group, BSU Council Back Herrin

The YMCA Cabinet and the Baptist Student Union Council, this week passed resolutions of confidence in the Rev. J. C. Herrin, Baptist Student Chaplain on the campus.

Herrin was one of three Baptist Student Union Leaders who were recently "given an opportunity to resign" by an investigative committee of the Baptist State Convention. The other two were the Rev. James W. Ray, state secretary of the BSU, and the Rev. Max Wicker, Baptist Student Chaplain at Duke.

The Y Cabinet resolution "unanimously" expressed "confidence in the ability of Rev. J. C. Herrin to the task of leading the local Baptist Student Union." It expressed a belief that under Herrin's leadership the BSU "has continually made an outstanding contribution to the total religious life" of the university. It concluded with a "sincere desire that Herrin be able to continue" as Baptist Student Chaplain.

The resolution of the BSU Council extended a vote of confidence to both Herrin and Ray, and protested "the methods of investigation of the committee appointed to investigate the program and personnel" of the BSU.

The reasons given for the protest were that neither the Carolina BSU, the Chapel Hill Baptist Church Board of Deacons, nor the Chapel Hill Baptist Church committee charged with church-student relations had been officially consulted.

The BSU Council affirmed its "Faith in the Baptist Student program" on the campus as they know it, and appealed "to the Baptists of the state to support our program."

Copies of the BSU Council resolution were sent to Dr. M. A. Huggins, the Rev. Douglas Branch, Dr. Perry Crouch and members of his committee.

The Baptist Student Union at Duke has issued a similar resolution supporting Wicker.
