Krepp, Baker, Drake Swim Fastest College Medley Relay

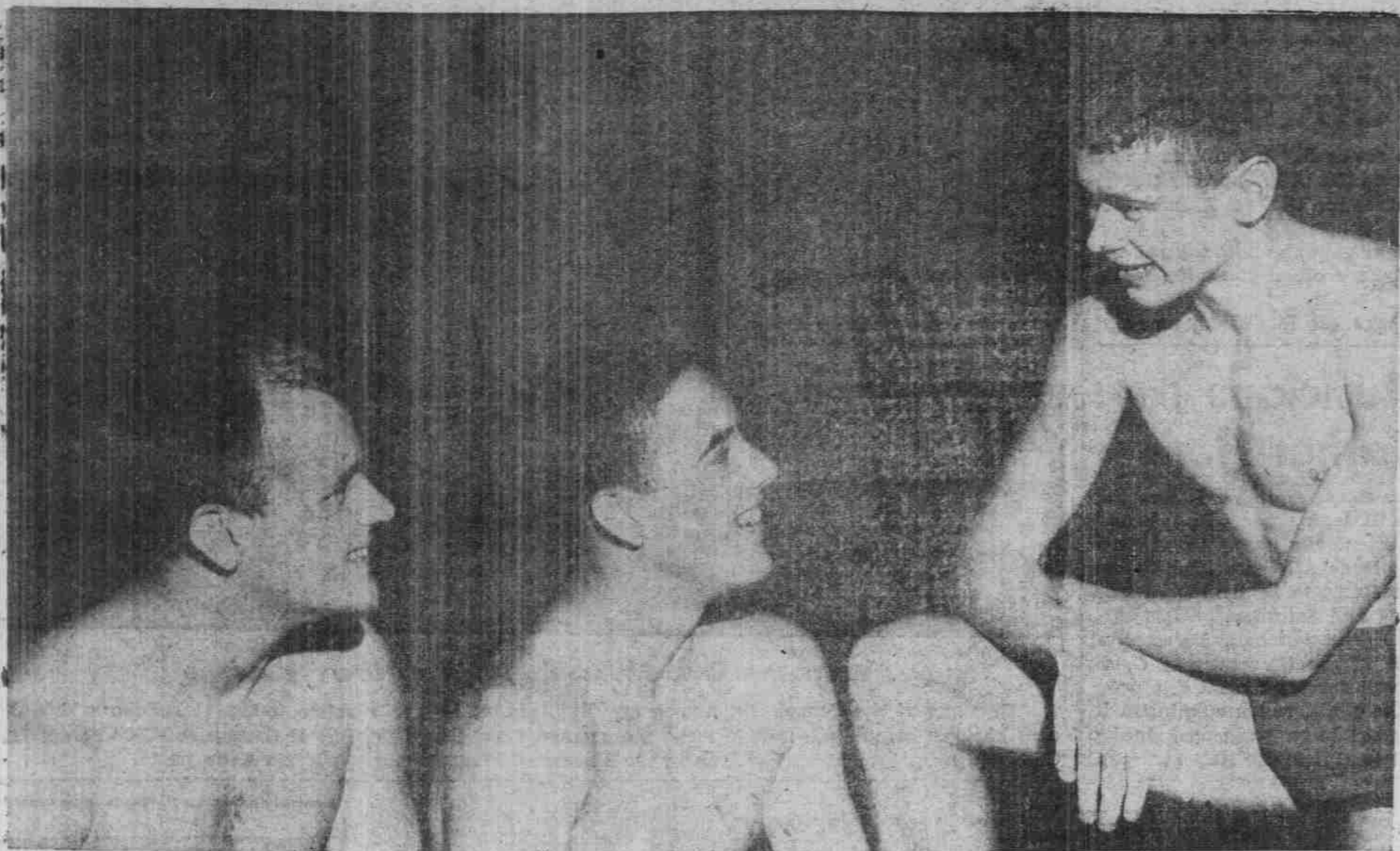
Charlie Krepp, Phil Drake, and Dick Baker, national collegiate and AAU 300-yard medley relay record holders, have been chosen by The Daily Tar Heel sports staff as "Athletes of the Week."

The event marks the first time this year that more than one person has gained the honor.

This relay team has swum the fastest 300-yard medley relay that has been recorded by any college team in the nation going the distance in 2:45.9. In this medley relay, the first 100 yards are swum backstroke, the second 100 yards breaststroke, and the final leg is freestyle.

Krepp, DTH "Athlete of the Week" after he set a new ACC record in the 200-yard backstroke, is a sophomore from Baltimore, Maryland. He is probably the best UNC backstroke swimmer since Jimmy Thomas, once recognized as one of the best backstroke swimmers in the world. He attended Baltimore City College and swam for the Widebrook Swim Club in Baltimore.

In the National AAU's he placed in three events. In the indoor meet he placed fourth in the 150-yard backstroke and sixth in the 100-yard backstroke. He was third in the 200-yard backstroke in the outdoor event. His time in the 200-yard back-

stroke against Michigan, after setting the record for the med-

ley relay, was the fastest time turned in by a collegiate swim-

mer in the past two years, 2:07.4. Drake, from Ft. Lauderdale,

Fla., attended Ft. Lauderdale High where he was placed on

the high school All-American team in the breast stroke and individual medley. He like Krepp, is a sophomore and is majoring in Economics. Last summer he won the 100-meter butterfly breaststroke in the Junior National AAU meet.

Just last week, it was announced that Drake was credited with two United States pool records. He recorded his record-breaking times last year in going the 100-yard course butterfly in 58.2 and the long course butterfly in 60.2.

Baker, anchor man on the relay, is from Greensboro, N. C. He attended Groton Prep in Massachusetts before entering UNC. He had no swimming experience before going out for the frosh team two years ago, however he was named the "Outstanding Freshman Swimmer" on the squad. A steadily improving freestyler, he recorded his best time in breaking the relay-record, 51.2. Dick is a junior majoring in history. In addition to swimming he has also lettered in lacrosse.

All three will be back next year and will be trying to better their own record.

Also in contention for the honor this week was the track medley relay team of Bill Booth, Boyd Newnam, Bobby Bardeen, and Jimmy Beatty, which set a record in the VMI Relays

San Francisco Replaces Kentucky As No. 1 Team In AP Poll

Wildcats Drop To 2nd; G. Washington Gets 6th; N. C. State Ranked 7th

The San Francisco Dons, who want to prove they're the best college basketball team in the nation, already have done a pretty good job of convincing the sports writers and broadcasters.

That was seen today when San Francisco was voted the No. 1

team by a big margin in the ninth weekly Associated Press ranking poll. The Dons were named first by 68 of 126 voters and polled a total of 1,107 points.

Kentucky, the leader ever since the second week of this season's poll, dropped to second place with only 19 first place votes and 367 points. Points are scored on the basis of 10 for each first place vote, nine for second, etc.

San Francisco, a ball control team with the nation's best defensive record this season, made the

top without the benefit of any advance ballyhoo. The Dons weren't listed in the pre-season poll, which La Salle was picked as the team most likely to succeed.

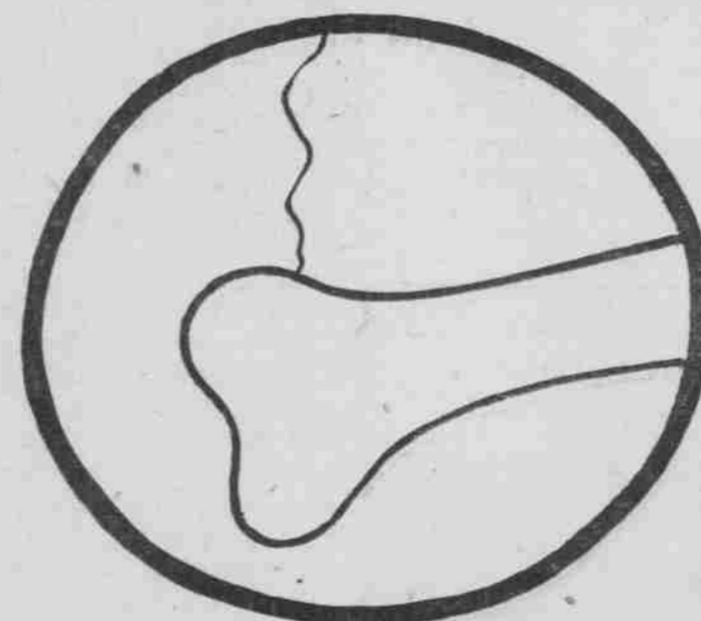

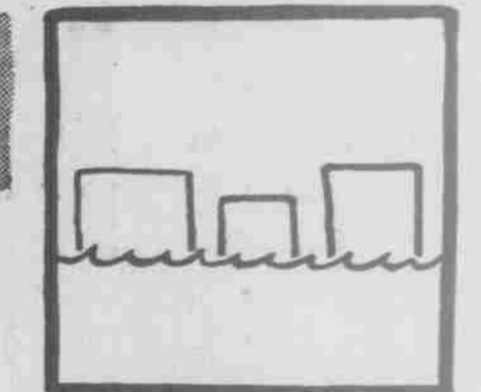

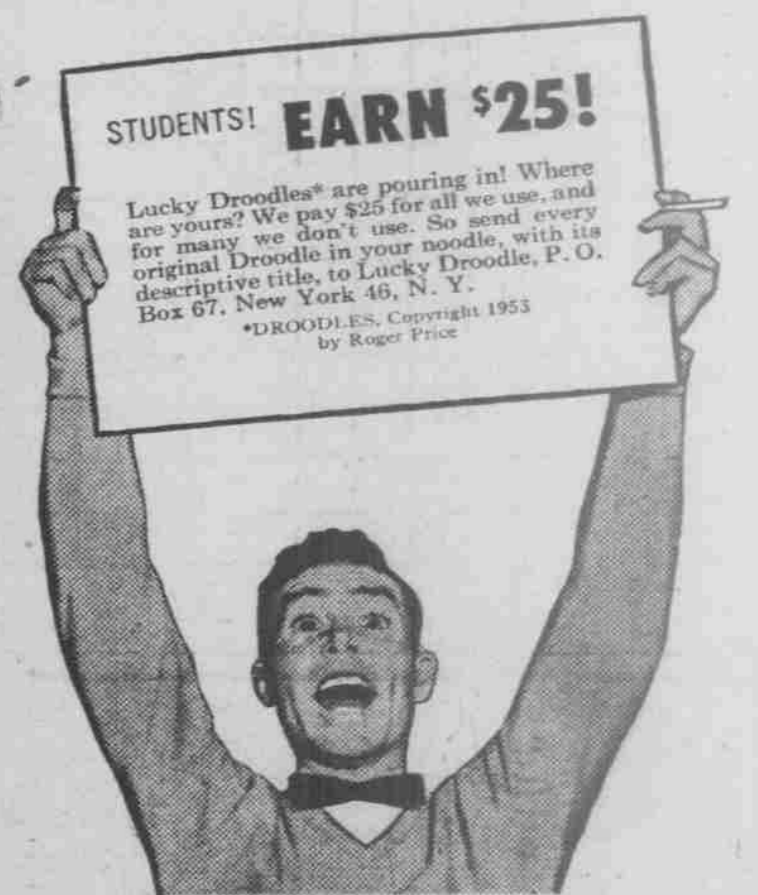
