

Judge Bryan, in sentencing Scales, said that once convicted under federal law, a man is not eligible for appeal bond unless a question of law is involved. Bryan denied bond when notice of appeal was given. Both Stanley and McCusty told Judge Dobie yesterday that no question of law was involved.


