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### Film Festival Starts Thursday, June 16

The Summer School Film Festival, sponsored by the Summer Activities Council and The Bureau of Visual Education of the Extension Division, will begin Thursday evening, June 16th, at 8:30 in Carroll Hall with its presentation of *The Chaplin Festival*, three groups of mutual comedies with Charlie Chaplin, produced in 1916 and 1917.

On June 23rd at 8:30, *Pygmalion*, based on the play by George Bernard Shaw, will be presented. It stars Leslie Howard and Wendy Miller.

At half past 8 on June 30th, the movie presentation will be *Jascha Heifetz*, a behind-the-scenes portrait of the violinist at home, working in his garden, playing tennis with his wife, and preparing for a concert. Also presented will be *Trio*, *Life's* widely-read photo-story on the great soloists, Rubenstein, Heifetz, and Piatigorsky, in rehearsals.

On July 7th, *Rigoletto* will be presented with costumed singers singing the best-known arias from the opera.

The July 14th presentation, *Morning Star*, shows the hazards encountered in a sheep drive from the Salt River Valley in Arizona to the home ranch in the White Mountains and closes with the 23rd Psalm, as scenes from the trip illustrate each phrase. *The Major Religions of the World*, also presented on the 14th, objectively surveys the origins, rituals, and symbols of the major religions of the world: Hinduism, Buddhism, Judaism, Christianity, and Mohammedism.

The Film Series will be continued during the Second Session each Thursday night. Among the Second Session films are *Macbeth*, starring Orson Welles, and *Open City*, starring Anna Magnani. These films will be shown admission-free to all summer school students and guests.

### Ford Foundation Will Offer Fellowships For Academic Year '56-'57

The Ford Foundation announced today it will offer fellowships for the academic year 1956-57 for study and research in foreign areas.

The fellowships will be available to persons under 40 years of age for graduate or post-doctoral work in the social sciences or humanities that pertains to Africa, Asia, the Near East, the Soviet Union or Eastern Europe. Study and research may be undertaken in the United States or abroad beginning as early as the summer of 1956.

The purpose of the fellowship program, which is beginning its fifth year, is to help create a more adequate supply of Americans trained to deal professionally with matters regarding the selected foreign areas. It is part of a broader Foundation program to increase international understanding and enable the United States to better discharge its international responsibilities.
