Euthanasia (mercy-killing), the subject of a strong debate at the Philanthropic Assembly Tuesday night was defeated by what Rep. Lawrence Matthews called "an overwhelming vote." Debate on the topic was strong but rather one-sided, since there was only one affirmative speaker. The bill, laid aside several times for other business, was approached from several different aspects, including those of moral, humanitarian, practical and Christian. The meeting, which was not adjourned until 11:30, was highlighted by the reception of the Dialectic Senate, in a body, to discuss the recipient of the annual Phi-Di award, which will be presented at a banquet on May 16.

Governor To Be Installed As Member Of Business Frat

Governor Luther Hodges and Greensboro businessman James Spencer Love will be honored by the UNC chapter of Alpha Kappa Psi, national professional business fraternity, at its Spring Pledge Banquet on Saturday. The Governor will be installed as an honorary member of the fraternity. Love, chairman of the board of Burlington Industries, Inc., will receive the special annual Civic Award. The special award is presented to a North Carolina businessman who, in the opinion of the chapter, has "upheld and promoted high ethical standards in business." Love will receive the award at the banquet to be held in the Sir Walter Hotel in Raleigh. The chapter will bestow honorary membership upon Hodges before the banquet. SERVICE Governor Hodges was chosen as an honorary member because of "his service to the state of North Carolina, and his interest in bringing new industry to the state," according to Bob Ratledge, president of the Alpha Tau chapter here. The Civic Award for 1956 will be given to Mr. Love "for his devotion to business, his high principles of business conduct and the manner in which he has devoted himself to worthy civic and educational organizations," Ratledge said. Love has served as chief executive of Burlington Industries, Inc. since its founding in 1923. He was president from 1930 to 1948, when he became chairman of the board. The executive is currently serving as vice-president of the Development Council of UNC. Mr. Love received his B.A. degree from Harvard in 1917 and holds LL.D. degrees from Elon and UNC. Recent recipients of the Civic Award include the then Lieutenant Governor Luther H. Hodges in 1954 and Charles W. McCrary, president of McCrary Hosiery Mill, in 1955.

Noted Poet Speaks Tonight In Library

Randall Jarrell, noted poet, novelist and critic will present a program of readings at 8 o'clock tonight in the Library Assembly Room. His appearance is being sponsored by the English Club. The internationally famous Jarrell will give readings from his own poems and some translations of Ranier Maria Rilke, the German poet. Visitors have been invited to attend the program. Jarrell's achievements include a recent appointment to the position of consultant poet in residence at the Library of Congress. Jarrell has distinguished himself in three fields of writing. He is considered one of the most outstanding younger poets in the nation today. His volumes of poetry include "Losses," "Seventeen crutches," and the recently published "Selected Poems." Poems by Jarrell have also appeared in most of the better-known literary magazines. He has just received an award from the Virginia Quarterly for his poetry. As a novelist, Jarrell has written "Pictures from an Institution," hailed by reviewers throughout the nation as probably "the wittiest novel ever written." He attained the status of a major critic with the publication of "Poetry and the Age." This book was so widely acclaimed that it has just been reprinted by the Virginia Press in its noted paperback series. Jarrell has also been a critic for the New York Times Book Review and other outstanding reviewing organs. The writer is presently a teacher of creative writing at the Woman's College in Greensboro and will leave that post at the end of the present semester to take up his duties at the Library of Congress.

Pritchett Is New President Of Old Well

Mebane Moore Pritchett, a rising senior from Lenoir, has been elected president of the Order of the Old Well for 1956-57. He was among 64 students initiated in annual ceremonies this week. Lawmakers Favor Phones For Dorms

Student lawmakers stamped approval last night on a resolution favoring installation of telephones on men's dormitory's second and fourth floors. The resolution, introduced by the Student Party's Clemm Shankle, calls for provision of necessary finances by the University. It also established a legislative committee to work in conjunction with the Interdormitory Council in carrying out the installation proposal. The measure was introduced as passed at the session by passage of special orders of consideration. APPOINTMENTS Speaker Sonny Evans appointed the committee during the session to facilitate immediate action and meeting with the administration. Committee members are Clemm Shankle (SP), Don Furtado (SP) and Al Alphin (SP). APPROVAL Representatives also approved presidential appointments to a committee for selection of delegates to the National Student Assn. Convention. Members approved were: Jim Holmes, Don Freeman, Harriet Bobbitt, Bill Wible and Jeep Myatt. NEW BILL The only new bill introduced at the session was a measure calling for awardment of certificates of achievement to freshmen who maintain a "B" average or above for two successive semesters.

Southern GOP Growth Is Hailed Here

Charles K. McWhorter, chairman of the Young Republican National Federation, Tuesday night hailed the growth of the Republican Party in the South before a dinner meeting of the Young Republican Club. "The rapid increase of Republican organization in all Southern states during the last six months is without parallel in American politics. Most of this increase has resulted from the decision of thousands of young people in the South to identify themselves as workers in the Republican Party and to work to build a strong two-party system. "College YRs have played a major role in this development. There are now nine YR groups on North Carolina campuses and more are in the process of organization before the summer holidays begin," he said.
