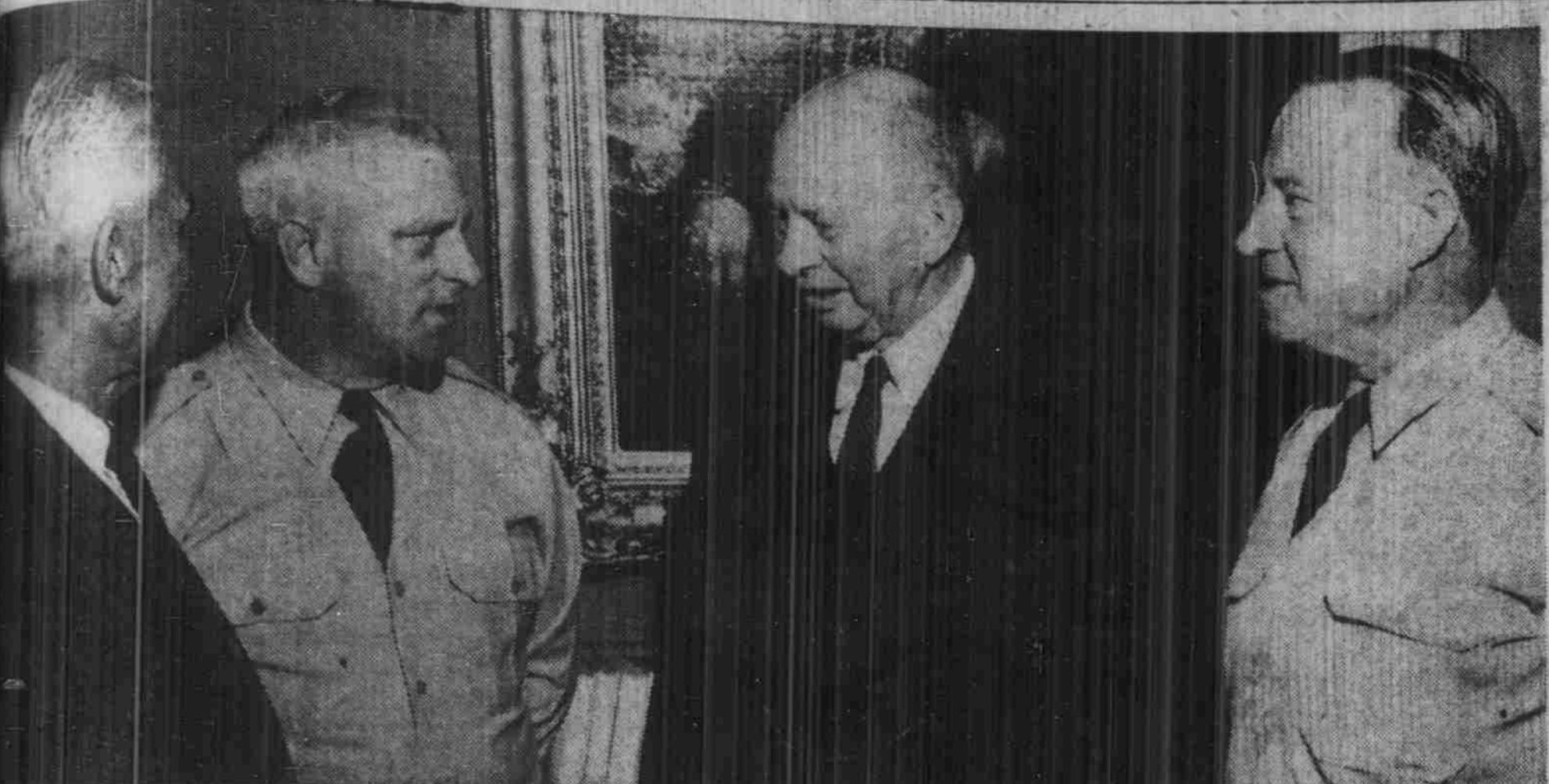

Several Appointments Will Be Made Tomorrow By Young

Student government appointments will be made to several offices by student body President Bob Young.
Young will make appointments to his Cabinet, the Elections Board, the Dance Committee, the Student Audit Board, Student Complaint Board, Student Council, Honor System Commission, Traffic Advisory Commission, Summer School—Student Government, and the Carolina Forum.
Each appointee will be notified personally tomorrow afternoon, Young said.
The Appointments Committee of the Student Legislature will hold meetings all through the week to interview appointees, who must be approved by the student Legislature.
Young yesterday urged the appointees appear before the committee as early in the week as possible.

Martha Fouse To Sing Tonight In Musicale

Mrs. Martha Fouse, soprano, will be the featured artist in the Petite Musicale presentation this evening.
The concert, which will be the seventh in Graham Memorial Activities Board's Sunday night series, will be held in the main lounge at 8 p.m. She will be accompanied by Walter Golde, pianist.
The program will include art songs in French, German, and English. An aria from Boito's "Mefistofele" and "The Nursery," a suite by Mussorgsky, will also be included.
Mrs. Fouse sang the role of Cherubino in the music department's production of "The Marriage of Figaro" last year. She will also be remembered for her performance as Magnolia in "Show Boat."
Admission to the concert is free and the public and the student body have been invited.

The North Carolina chapter of an international flying club—the Women 99's—will meet at 11 a.m. Sunday at the airport.

Johannes Laursen, noted Danish writer and lecturer will visit the campus tomorrow and Tuesday.
His visit is being sponsored by the YMCA and the Political Science Dept.
Laursen will give a talk in Lenoir Hall tomorrow from 6 to 7:30 p.m. The topic of his address will be "Denmark Today." A movie and a discussion period will follow.
In addition, Laursen's schedule includes addressing political science classes and a journalism class.
Presently with the Danish Information Office in New York City, Laursen, 40, received his M.A. in Political Science and Economics at the University of Copenhagen in 1940.
He has served with the Danish Ministries of Commerce and Social Affairs and on the staff of a Copenhagen daily newspaper as a writer on economic and political subjects. He is a co-author of a book on the Danish Government and Civil Administration, and in 1954 his book on the American political scene was published in Denmark.
In 1950 Laursen made an extensive tour of the United States under the auspices of the American-Scandinavian Foundation, studying government information programs on the State as well as the Federal level.
Since October, 1950, Laursen has been with the Danish Information Office in New York. The purpose of this organization is to disseminate information about Denmark in the United States.

Carolina Playmakers To End Season Tonight

The final performance of the Carolina Playmakers' 1955-56 season will be tonight at 8:30 at the Forest Theatre, when they present the last of three outdoor performances of Shakespeare's "A Midsummer-Night's Dream."
Remaining in the theatre group's schedule are two programs of student-written, one-act plays, to appear at the Playmakers Theatre, May 16 and 17 and June 4.
Directed by James M. Riley of the Playmakers' staff, the comedy of love complications in the mortal and fairy worlds has a cast of thirty-seven, including two UNC professors who appear as comic rustics. Kai Jurgensen and Walter Smith, professors of dramatic art and statistics, will portray Quince and Bottom.
Titania, queen of the fairies, is played by Mrs. Jane Albans, of Chapel Hill, who appeared as Ondine in the Playmakers' October production of "Ondine." Oberon, her king, will be Russell Link, of Jamaica, N. Y., and Puck will be played by Dick Newdick, of Augusta, Maine. Portraying Theseus and Hippolyta will be Jim Potter of Goldsboro, and Mrs. Mary Smith, of Chapel Hill.
The two pairs of lovers confused by the pranks of Puck will be James Secrest of Thomasville, as Lysander; Miss Gloria DiCostanza, of Chapel Hill, as Hermia; Al Gordon, of Goldsboro, as Demetrius; and Miss Louise Fletcher, of Birmingham, Ala., as Helena.
The current production of the Shakespeare play will be the third by the Playmakers, the first two having appeared in 1933 and 1943. Another Shakespeare comedy, "The Taming of the Shrew," was the first play at the Forest Theatre, in July, 1919. The outdoor theatre is now dedicated to the late Professor Frederick H. (Proff) Koch, founder and first director of the Playmakers, who died in 1944.
All seats for the outdoor theatre are unreserved, and tickets may be purchased or exchanged for season ticket stubs at the box office before performance.
