### Frances Bold Receives Grant

A Fulbright Fellowship for study at the University of London during the 1956-57 academic year has been granted to Miss Frances Bold, a UNC graduate student from Hills Church, Va.

Dr. Sturgis E. Leavitt, Kenan professor of Spanish, and campus representative for the Fulbright program, announced that Miss Bold will work at the School of Library Studies and Archives in the University College at University of London.

In addition to studying conservation and repair of books and manuscripts, Miss Bold expects to visit a number of libraries in England. She will sail from New York in early September.

Miss Bold will receive her M. S. degree in library science, with a minor in history, in June. Her thesis pertains to Robert Burns. She has been active in the Canterbury Club and the Cosmopolitan Club while here.

The meeting was the last meeting of the year for the Student Party, commonly referred to as "old soldier's night."

### Cambridge Dean Aston To Talk Here Tonight

Dean Stanley C. Aston, an authority on Provencal literature from University of Cambridge, England, will give a lecture here tonight, sponsored jointly by North Carolina and Duke.

He will speak on "Graduate Studies in British Universities" at 8 p.m. in the Assembly Room of the Louis R. Wilson Library. The public is invited.

In addition to his public lecture, Dean Aston will address R. W. Linker's and U. T. Holmes' classes in Provencal and Old French. Organizers of Dean Aston's visit to Chapel Hill are Robert A. Pratt of the English Department and W. P. Friederich of the Germanic Languages Dept.

Prof. Aston is a Fellow of St. Catherine's College and is chairman of the Modern Humanities Research Association.

Reid, who has occupied positions as floorleader, attorney-general and vice-chairman of the Student Party, said that "student government is the greatest institution for teaching individuals about life and its objectives."

Reid stated that he would like to see student government look more deeply into several areas on the campus here. "I would like to see an administration program that looks beyond just the present administration and that defines its future objectives," he said.

"In the student legislature," Reid said, "I would like to see it establish a student government code similar to the North Carolina Code. I would like to see it establish definite penalties for any student body infractions against the Honor Code."

Several "old soldiers" stood up to give their parting words to the party. Larry McElroy, past floor leader, stated again the dare of Dean Fred Weaver that student government can have all the power that it is capable of handling. Charles Katzenstein stated that he hoped the Student Party will be ready for the next election, both with a good candidate and a good record while in office.

Miss Patricia McBane, past vice-chairman of the Student Party, injected a note of sentimentality into the meeting as she asked the party members "to realize their duty and the work to be done."

Miss McBane said she hoped that

there would be "a harmony of minds and hands formulating the policies for the party."

"I ask for a realization of the work done, the work to be carried on in the future, and appreciation of the Carolina spirit, love and a friendship based on a 'togetherness,'" Miss McBane said.
