# 2,504 Attend WC This Fall

GREENSBORO, Oct. 3 (AP) Classes at Woman's College for the fall semester are being attended by a total of 2,504 students, according to Rollin E. Godfrey, college registrar.

A count completed today shows 2.064 undergraduate students who are enrolled for bachelor of arts and bachelor of science degrees. The number includes 407 seniors. 377 juniors, 580 sophomores and 700 freshmen.

The one-year commercial class has an enrollment of 216 students and there are 38 special students. Some 35 graduate students are included in the list and 151 additional graduate students, many of them teachers and principals, are attending Saturday classes working. toward advanced degrees.

The enrollment this year is 131 above the 1955-56 regular session count of 2,373 students.




