HIGH POINT —(AP) — Miss Mary Owen Graham, a retired educator and a cousin of Dr. Frank Porter Graham, United Nations mediator, died at 8:45 o'clock Sunday night in the Presbyterian home here.

She was a professor at Woman's College, Greensboro, from 1908 to 1912, and was a former president of Peace Institute at Raleigh, now Peace Junior College.

She was an aunt of Dr. Edward Kidder Graham, former chancellor of Woman's College, who is now at Wellesley, Mass.

She had been at the Presbyterian home since last June 26. She had been critically ill for four days.

Funeral arrangements were incomplete as of Sunday night.

BIOLOGISTS

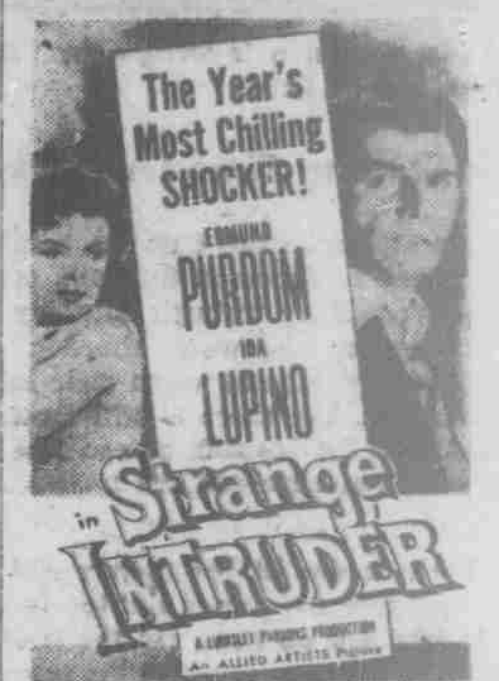
