thought they had worked out an agreement last night. That collapsed, however, when Faubus' reception of the proposal failed to satisfy Eisenhower. Two of the nine integrated Negroes were reportedly chased, beaten and kicked today inside Central High School. The two Negroes, both boys, were not injured.

"We wanted to make it so miserable, they wouldn't want to go to the school," said a white boy who described himself as one of the Negroes' tormenters.

The two Negroes were identified by the white boy and a companion as Terrance Roberts and Jefferson Thomas. The white boys said the Negroes eventually were rescued by a teacher, although national guardsmen were on duty inside the building at the time.

In New York the National Council of Churches today delayed a proposed commendation of President Eisenhower for upholding desegregation laws after a suggestion that "some southern governors" also be commended. No opposition was expressed to a portion of the declaration lauding President Eisenhower's handling of the Arkansas racial crisis, but action was stalled by the suggested pat on the back to some southern governors.
