Agreement

PARIS, Dec. 18. —The NATO Summit Conference reached complete agreement today on a U. S. offer of medium-range missiles to western Europe and a new approach to Russia for disarmament negotiations.

The decisions were announced by Secretary General Paul-Henri Spaak of Belgium as the Summit Conference neared its end.

The plan for new disarmament talks was put forward by Foreign Minister Christian Pineau of France. It calls for a direct approach to Russia by the United States, Britain, France and Canada.

Refuse To Attend

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Dec. 18. —About 50 white pupils refused to attend classes at Central High School today as a result of a dispute between two girls at the school, one white and the other Negro.

Some of the pupils walked out of the school and others refused to enter. They congregated across a street and leered and called to the pupils inside.

Police dispersed the pupils, who had rejected appeals by Principal A. B. Jordan and other pupils to enter.

Destruction

LONDON, Dec. 18. —Nikita Khrushchev in a magazine article today raised the specter of nuclear destruction for any West European nation allowing American atomic bases on its territory.

At the same time he said he wants meetings of Soviet and American leaders to "discuss conditions of coexistence."

The Soviet Communist Party boss said countries which accept American atomic bases face "shattering retaliatory attacks" in the event of a war launched against Russia as a result of a misunderstanding or at the discretion of some American officer.

Denies Charges

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18. —America's atomic boss today personally denied unofficial British charges that the United States has barred Britain from announcing a big step toward harnessing the H-bomb for peace.

Adm. Lewis L. Strauss, chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC), also said the achievement of H-power "is still remote."

Strauss had his office here release a statement he drafted in Paris, where he is attending the NATO Summit parley. It began:

"A report to the effect that the United Kingdom Atomic Energy Authority has suppressed announcement of success in the control of the fusion reaction at my request is completely false."

RALEIGH, Dec. 18. —Attorneys for a Negro youth seeking an injunction to allow integration at the all-white Broughton High School here, said today they will request a special hearing sometime in January.

Herman Taylor said he plans to contact Federal Judge Don Gilliam soon as to a convenient date for the hearing.

Disability

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18. —Sen. Ervin (D-NC) said today the problem of presidential disability will be studied seriously by Congress next year. Such study is urgent, he said, because of the illness of President Eisenhower.

J. C. Ingram has been named chairman of a faculty committee to investigate student government recommendations for new class excuse regulations.

Prof. James Godfrey, dean of the faculty announced the committee appointments after the faculty council meeting yesterday.

Other members of the committee will be Dean Neil Luxon, and Professors Carl Brown, J. R. Caldwell, Norman Eliason, A. E. Radford and D. W. Wall.

The committee will report its findings at the February meeting of the Faculty Council.

At the December meeting of the council Student Body President Sonny Evans outlined a suggestion that class excuses in the case of sickness be granted by the individual instructor rather than by the infirmary. Evans said the present regulations are unnecessary under the Honor System.

Eisenhower Meets With President Coty

PARIS, Dec. 18 (AP)—President Eisenhower tonight pushed hard at the job of bolstering the Atlantic Alliance in the closing sessions of the Nato Summit Conference.

The President sat in at a night meeting, the first to start in the evening since the conference opened Monday. He also arranged to start back to Washington early tomorrow evening. His plane is scheduled to arrive in the U. S. capital about 6:30 a.m. EST Friday.

Eisenhower went to the conference table at the Palais de Chaillot a few minutes before 6 and stayed until the end of the session at 8:05 p.m.

He joined the other chiefs of government after the United States at a daytime meeting of the foreign ministers, had won agreement in principle on its plans for setting up missile bases and a stockpile of atomic warheads in Europe to deal with any Soviet aggression.

The President was smiling broadly as he arrived at the Palais from the nearby U. S. Embassy residence. He had rested at the embassy in the afternoon after being the luncheon guest of President Rene Coty of France at the Elysee Palace.

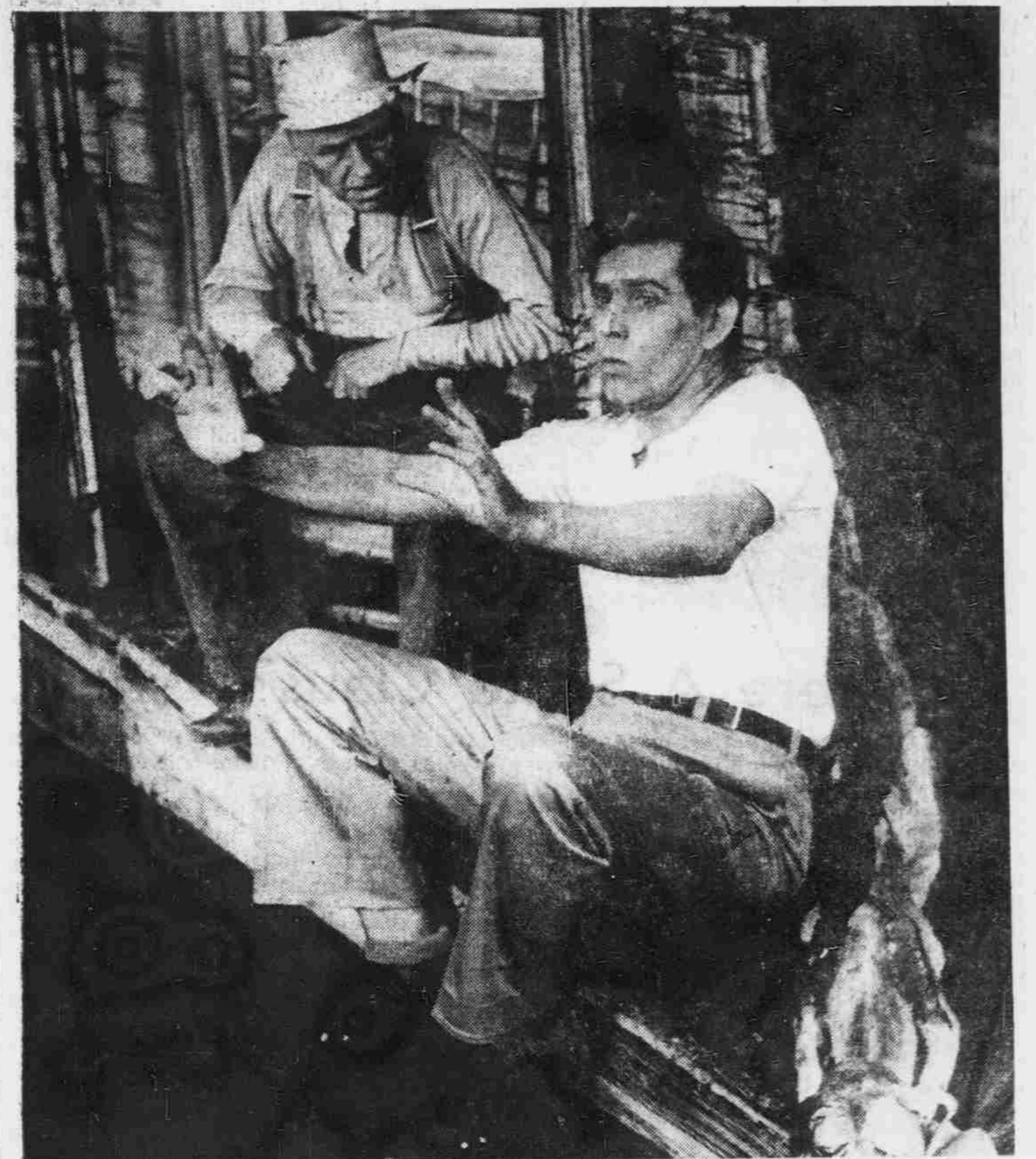

"We should cast aside these material things and bring back the spirit of Jesus Christ," urged Representative Clarence Simpson.

Representative David Matthews asserted that the only people who really benefitted from the commercialization were those who sold things. He called for "a return to the true ideals of Christmas."

New Book By Former Student Reviews Court's Police Power

A new book has just been published that had its birth in the classrooms of the Department of Political Science of UNC.

It is "The Supreme Court and State Police Power, A Study in Federalism" by Dr. Ruth Locke Roettinger, who received her Ph.D. degree in political science at UNC.

The book is an outgrowth of her attending the classes of Prof. W. S. Jenkins in constitutional law, where dozens of the cases she writes about were reviewed.

A book had been written reviewing the U. S. Supreme Court's decisions affecting state police powers from 1910-30. This volume takes up cases that came before the court after 1930. This book was Dr. Roettinger's dissertation for her Ph.D. degree at UNC.

The preface of the book is written by Dr. W. W. Pierson, former dean of the UNC Graduate School, who says: "The author's observations and reflections may be considered representative of the prevailing current opinion in the South. However, she is dealing with issues of such gravity, relative to both security and constitutionalism, that the book might well be of interest and importance to a wider reading public."

The final chapters of the book deal with the recent rulings by the court in regard to segregation in the southern states. In listing the sources of her material, Dr. Roettinger showed the "Records of the States of the United States of America." This material is the joint microfilm project carried out by

UNC and the Library of Congress and directed by Prof. Jenkins.

In writing about the microfilm project done by UNC and the Library of Congress, the author pointed out that for the first time in history, in a recent school segregation case, it was possible to consult the entire public record of state consideration of the ratification of the Fourteenth Amendment.

Dr. Roettinger, formerly taught here at UNC and is presently a member of the faculty of the Department of Government of Sweet Briar College.
