PARIS, Dec. 18. 4-The NATO Summit Conference reached complete agreement today on a U. S. offer of medium-range missiles for western Europe and a new approach to Russia for disarmament negotiations.

The decisions were announced by Secretary General Paul-Henri Spaak of Belgium as the Summit Conference neared its end.

The plan for new disarmament talks was put forward by Foreign Minister Christian Pineau of France. It calls for a direct approach to Russia by the United States, Britain, France and Can-
