TAR HEEL HONORS — Three representatives of Carolina at the recent athletic meetings in Philadelphia returned with new honors. . . . Ollie Cornwell was named vice-president of NCAA district three and retains his place on the powerful NCAA Council, which he has held for many years. . . . Coach Jim Tatum was elected second vice-president of the American Football Coaches Association. . . . Walter Rabb was named third vice-president of the American Association of College Baseball Coaches.

COACH OF YEAR—Frank McGuire's newest honor was announced a few days ago. . . . He was selected as the 1956-57 basketball "Coach of the Year" by

the famous Rockne Club of Kansas City. . . . He previously had been named to this honor by various other agencies. . . . McGuire succeeds Coach Phil Woolpert of San Francisco and will be presented his trophy at the Rockne Testimonial Dinner in Kansas City on March 3.

KEARNS IS THIRD

Brennan Holds ACC Scoring Lead

GREENSBORO — Carolina's Pete Brennan, who last week enjoyed a 2.7-point lead over the field, continues to pace Atlantic Coast Conference basketball point-producers but by a much slimmer margin.

Latest ACC Service Bureau figures, through games of last Saturday night, show Brennan the leader with 21 points a game and Virginia's Herb Busch second at 19.8. A week ago Brennan was averaging 20.7 points, Busch 18.0.

The battle for season individual scoring honors apparently has boiled down to Brennan vs. Busch, for the man closest to the top due in Carolina's Tommy Kearns, who is almost five points off the pace at 16.2. Dave Budd of Wake Forest, a 6-6 sophomore, is fourth at 15.8 points a game and Lou Pucillo of N. C. State, smallest regular in the conference at 5-foot-9 and 150 pounds, is fifth at 14.7.

Brennan is a double efficiency leader for the second straight week, topping individual rebounds once more with 12.2 recoveries a game. Busch is a close second here, too, averaging 11.7.

In the shooting departments, N. C. State's Bob MacGillivray, stands far ahead of the field with 60 goals in 106 shots for an accuracy percentage of 565. George Ritchie, Wake Forest sophomore, is the top man in free throw accuracy at 848 on 28 for 33.

Busch ranks second in field goal shooting at 514 and Budd ranks third at 508. In addition, Busch is fourth in free throw shooting at 813.

In the diving will be Ned Meekins and Pete Reynolds, while Kit Mercer will swim the breaststroke.

This heart-pounding was repetitions of the Dixie Classic finals until the final few minutes when the two clubs opened up their attack just a bit.

Carolina Ties

Salz hit a jumper to make it 28-23. State's classy little guard Lou Pucillo hit a couple of free throws to make it 30-28 and Kearns took over for Carolina. Tommy hit a jumper and two charity tosses to send the Chapel Hillians into the lead for the first time 32-30 with 10:10 left.

With Kearns hitting two more jumpers, the Tar Heels began pulling away. 39-34 with 5:53 remaining. But State had just begun to fight and a minute and ten later it was 41-38. From there the Tar Heels built the lead to 44-39 then to 45-41 at 1:39 but that was all the scoring in store for the home team the rest of the regulation game.

Stepanovich Hits

State reserve George Stepanovich hit three points and Gallagher hit two to send it into overtime. Stepanovich's hook shot with 22 seconds to go was the tying goal.

Kearns was the Tar Heel's top scorer with 17 points. Salz's 13 was good for second best. Shaffer tossed in 10. ACC scoring leader Pete Brennan was held to four and fouled out with about three minutes left in the regulation game. Whitey Bell was tops for State with 14.

State out-bounded the Wolfpack 41-35. From the floor, Carolina was 33.3 while the Wolfpack hit 45.2. Only 79 shots were taken between the two clubs in this possession-minded Big Four extravaganza.

ACC Grid Slate Discussion Is Predicted Here

DURHAM, N. C., Jan. 15 (AP)—Athletic directors of the Atlantic Coast Conference gather at near-Chapel Hill for what is described as a routine meeting Jan. 31 to Feb. 1, but it is likely that they will discuss a matter of more than routine interest.

Schedules in football and Spring sports will occupy most of the time, but football involves the problem of what to do about bolstering attendance.

It was suggested at the last ACC meeting six weeks ago that thought be given to erecting lights at Duke Stadium. This would enable teams in the congested Duke-Carolina-State area to avoid conflicts in scheduling home games.

Eddie Cameron, Duke athletic director, said the proposal is only in the exploratory stages yet. "I'd like to know who will pay for the lights, for instance," he explained. "It would cost between \$75,000 and \$90,000 to install them."

Last season on two successive October Saturdays Duke played Virginia and Maryland at home while at Chapel Hill, a dozen miles away, Carolina was meeting Clemson and Navy.

It is this sort of conflict hurting all schools involved that the athletic directors are seeking to avoid. Some feel that the erection of lights to permit night play at Duke on days when afternoon contests are scheduled either at Chapel Hill or Raleigh, home of North Carolina State, would ease the situation.

Over the last three seasons Duke has averaged under 24,000 for 14 home games, despite a regular season record of 18 victories, 8 losses and 4 ties.

Twice last season Duke employed a so-called "family plan" whereby a child was admitted free if accompanied by a ticket-purchasing adult, not necessarily the child's parent. It resulted in no appreciable attendance boost.

"We plan to try the plan again this year," said Cameron. "If we can get the eight and nine-year-olds to come to our games we feel we are winning future fans."

He indicated Duke's willingness to listen to talk of lighting the stadium, but stressed that how the cost of lighting the plant would be met was a matter of prime concern to him.

UNC Frosh Rally Late To Tie In Regulation

Carolina's Tar Babies dropped their second game last night, 78-75 to the Wolflets of State College in a thrilling overtime contest that could have gone either way.

State's flashy little 5-11 guard Mark Reiner turned from goat to hero when he converted two foul shots with only 11 seconds showing on the clock to sew up the game for the State frosh. This same Wolflet had missed a foul with only 2 seconds left in the regulation game causing the game to go into the overtime at 69-69.

Trilled at Half

The Tar Babies trailing 30-32 at intermission got off to a bad start in the second half and the Wolflets quickly compiled a 12 points lead with 13:00 left. The Carolina boys found their difficulty—control of the boards—and began closing the margin.

Forwards Pete Longenecker and Doug Moe led the renewed attack and with 1:26 to go things were all even again. Both teams then scored four each and the clock ran out. With 58 seconds left in the overtime Longenecker hit two foul shots making it 75-73 State. State converted a foul shot then Tar Baby center Hugh Donohue hit a driving layup putting Carolina within one point with 26 seconds left.

Carolina's last opportunity was when Wolflet Larry Ranta missed a

free throw. Donohue rebounded but knocked it out of bounds. State, with the ball, forced the Tar Babies to foul Reiner who converted to win the game.

Sime Is First Entry For Millrose Games

NEW YORK, Jan. 15 (AP)—Olympic sprinter and world record holder Dave Sime of Duke University today became the first official entry for the 51st Millrose Games, which open the track season at Madison Square Garden, Feb. 8. Sime won the Millrose sprint in his indoor debut two years ago but was touring in Asia when last year's meet was held.

Meet director Fred Schertz said that although he had not released any entries until today, he already had the biggest advance sale of tickets in the meet's history.

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
