

Maryland Retains ACC Indoor Track Title

The Maryland Terps, fielding power in every event, won their third straight ACC Indoor track championship here last night in a meet that saw four new conference records posted and two more equaled.

Terp distance man Burr Grim played the leading part by setting a new 2-mile record and tying the mile mark. Adding to the Terp record smashing club was the 2-mile relay team of Fleming, Rams, West and Harvey. Another Terp, Tom Tait led his own high jump record.

South Carolina's Dave Coates got the meet off to a great start yesterday morning by heaving the shot past the conference mark. His throw of 52' 3/4" topped the 51' 1/2" record set by Lawshe of Duke in 1955.

Carolina's Dave Scurlock running

in three events posted a new conference mark in the 600. Maryland's Robert Lowndes had set a new record in the afternoon trials to 1:15.7 but Scurlock came back in the finals and clocked 1:12.7. He also won the 880 and anchored Carolina's relay team which came home third.

The most exciting moments of the always colorful meet came during the two-mile run, Grim broke the record but not without plenty of trouble from Carolina's Wayne Bishop who was a doubtful starter.

Bishop and Grim stepped out from the pack at the start. Running as one the lead changed 12 times in the 20 lap race and was not decided until Grim passed Bishop in the back stretch of the final lap. He poured on his famous kick and won by 15 yards.

Two of the listed doubtful start-

ers did not compete. Dave Sime of Duke, last year's 60-dash champion, did not want to risk injuring a sore leg and Carolina's Everett Whatley, Grim's mile threat, was not fully recovered from a case of the measles.

South Carolina's Don Goodroe joined Grim and Scurlock on the double winner list. He won both the high and low hurdles defeating defending champion Jim Starboard of Maryland.

Mermen Get Five More Medals; A Total Of 11

Carolina's swimming team, unbeaten during the regular season and champions of the Atlantic Coast Conference, displayed the strength of its individual members again yesterday afternoon in Bowman Gray Pool as the Tar Heel swimmers took first places in five of the seven events.

The Tar Heel winners were Mac Mahaffy in the 100 yard butterfly, Walt Rose in the 100 yard freestyle, Tony Schiffman in the 440 yard freestyle, and Ned Meekins in the high diving event. The other Carolina first was taken by the 400 yard medley relay team composed of Brent Nash, Mahaffy, Bill Zickgraf, and Rose.

Fadgen Sets Record
North Carolina State mermen won the 200 yard breaststroke and the 100 yard backstroke. The Wolfpack's Dick Fadgen took his third win of the meet in the breaststroke event when he set a new conference and pool record of 2:28.9. State's other victory came in the 100 yard backstroke where Frank Merchel edged out Carolina's Brent Nash for the win.

Prior to the high diving event Charles McHugh, Chairman of the ACC Swimming Committee, presented the ACC team championship trophy to Carolina co-captains Bill Roth and Walt Rose.

Schiffman Paces Tar Heels
Combined with the results of the finals held Friday night, Carolina swept first places in eleven of the sixteen events. Tony Schiffman led the Tar Heel parade with three firsts followed closely by Ned Meekins and Walt Rose with two apiece.

All of the relay events were captured by Carolina teams.

In all of the events run yesterday except the 100 yard butterfly the winning time was better than any qualifying time. Again with the exception of the 100 yard butterfly, all the events were won by the swimmer who had the best qualifying time.

Seniors Graduate
Next year Carolina Coach Pat Earey will have a great rebuilding job to do to replace five seniors who will graduate. The loss of Mac Mahaffy, Billy Zickgraf, Walt Rose, Bill Roth, and Ned Meekins will put a big dent into the present lineup.

Bowman Gray Pool will again host the ACC championships next year on February 25, 26, and 27.
