## Student Solons Pass **Budget For Next Year**

A special session of the 24th assembly of the Student Legislature 087 devoted a majority of its time last night to take action on a \$121,000 785 budget for the coming school year.

The mony for the budget is provided for by part of the student 307 block fees paid at the beginning of each semester. The budget was figured on anticipated enrollment of 5,400 undergraduates and 1,925 387 graduates and professional school students.

An appropriation of \$200 to the University Club for confetti raised some questions. Al Goldsmith (UP) amended the appropriation to read \$125 for this item.

At the suggestion of Dave Jones, president of the University Club, Goldsmith added a \$75 president's discretionary fund and \$50 to cover the rent of office space.
