## Administrative Team Visiting Middle East

Five midwestern universities are being visited by a UNC administrative team to compare notes on operational procedures in admissions, record-keeping and accounting.

Charles C. Bernard, acting director of admissions; H. L. Ferguson Jr., director of accounting and budgets, and Raymond E. Strong, assistant director of Central Records Office, form the UNC travel team.

Through Oct. 10 they will visit the campuses of the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, Michigan State University in East Lansing, Purdue University in Lafayette, Ind., Indiana University in Bloomington, and Ohio State University in Columbus.

Strong will study the academic record-keeping systems, particularly methods of handling registration at the beginning of terms. Bernard's special interest will be in technical processes and services in the admissions offices.

In his observation on accounting procedures, Ferguson will be especially interested in those adapted to punch card equipment.
