

### Post Office To Open Early

The Chapel Hill Post Office will begin opening its stamp and parcel post windows an hour earlier Monday to help take care of the anticipated Christmas rush.

Postmaster Paul Cheek announced the new hours and noted that one mailing window was put under the new hours this Monday. Normally, the windows are operated from 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

The new hours will remain in effect until decreased volume necessitates a change, Mr. Cheek said.

According to the Postmaster, the Yule "rush" hasn't hit the local office yet, although an increased volume was apparent Tuesday.

"It's getting heavier every day," he said.

## New York Site Of Debates; Four UNC Debaters Attend

Four outstanding UNC debaters are in New York this weekend for the annual Hall of Fame Debate Tournament.

Tom Long and John Brooks (the affirmative team) and Clay Simpson and David Evans (the negative team) left yesterday for the tournament to be attended by around 70 colleges and universities.

Representative institutions will include: Princeton, Harvard, Yale, the Naval Academy, Boston College and Washington and Lee University.

In 1956, a UNC debate team, composed of Brooks and Sonny Evans '58, took third place at this tournament.

This year, in New York University's Hall of Fame (the up-town campus), the debate will focus on the nuclear weapons issue. The topic for five rounds of debating is "Resolved: That the further development of nuclear weapons should be prohibited by international agreement."

All four Carolina debaters have had several years of experience in collegiate debating and have won various honors in tournaments.

Now in his fourth year of debating, John Brooks headed the Debate Squad last year and is currently president of the Forensic Council (the control body for all debate organizations). One of his achievements was the third place honor he and Evans took at the New York in 1956.

Tom Long, the other member of the affirmative team, took second place honors this year at the Emory University Peach Tree Tournament. Long, a senior, is in his second year of debating.

The incumbent president of the Debate Squad is Clay Simpson, a member of the negative team at the New York tournament. Simpson has had over two years of debate experience.

David Evans, Simpson's partner on the negative team, has also been debating for two years.

The number of tournaments UNC debaters are entering this year has increased two-fold, Simpson (Debate Squad president) commented this week. He also said that the number of participants has doubled.

After the present New York tournament, others coming up next semester include: Marshall Wytte Tournament at William and Mary, Brooklyn University Debate Tournament, Boston University Debate Tournament, ACC Conference Tournament, Capital Hill Tournament at the University of Maryland and the Southern Universities Tournament at Vanderbilt (for the top eight Southern institutions scholastically).

Thus far, University debaters have attended: the University of Virginia Discussion Tournament, South Carolina Forensic Tournament, Emory University Peach Tree Tournament and the Dixie Classic Tournament at Wake Forest.

Second place honors were taken at the Emory tournament and UNC's novice team placed third at Wake Forest.

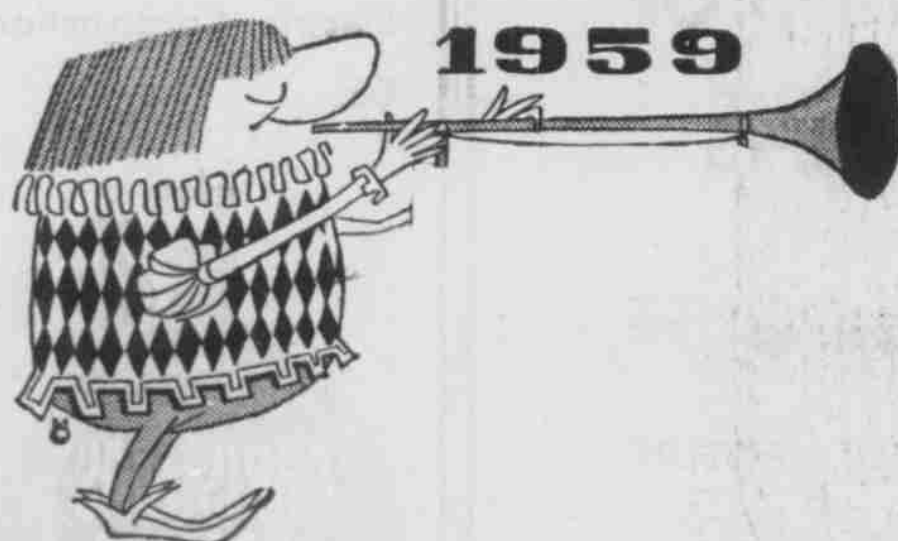

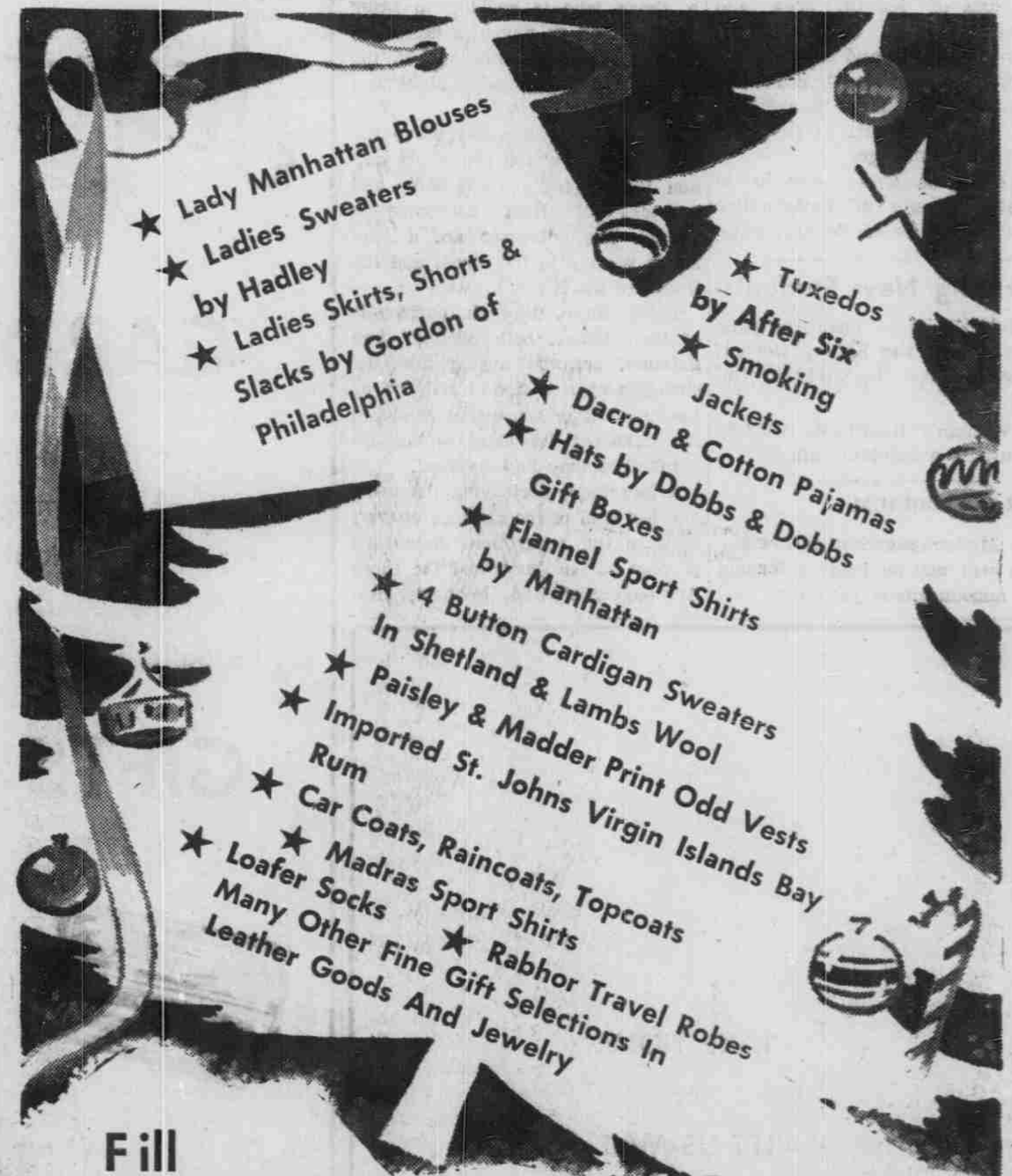
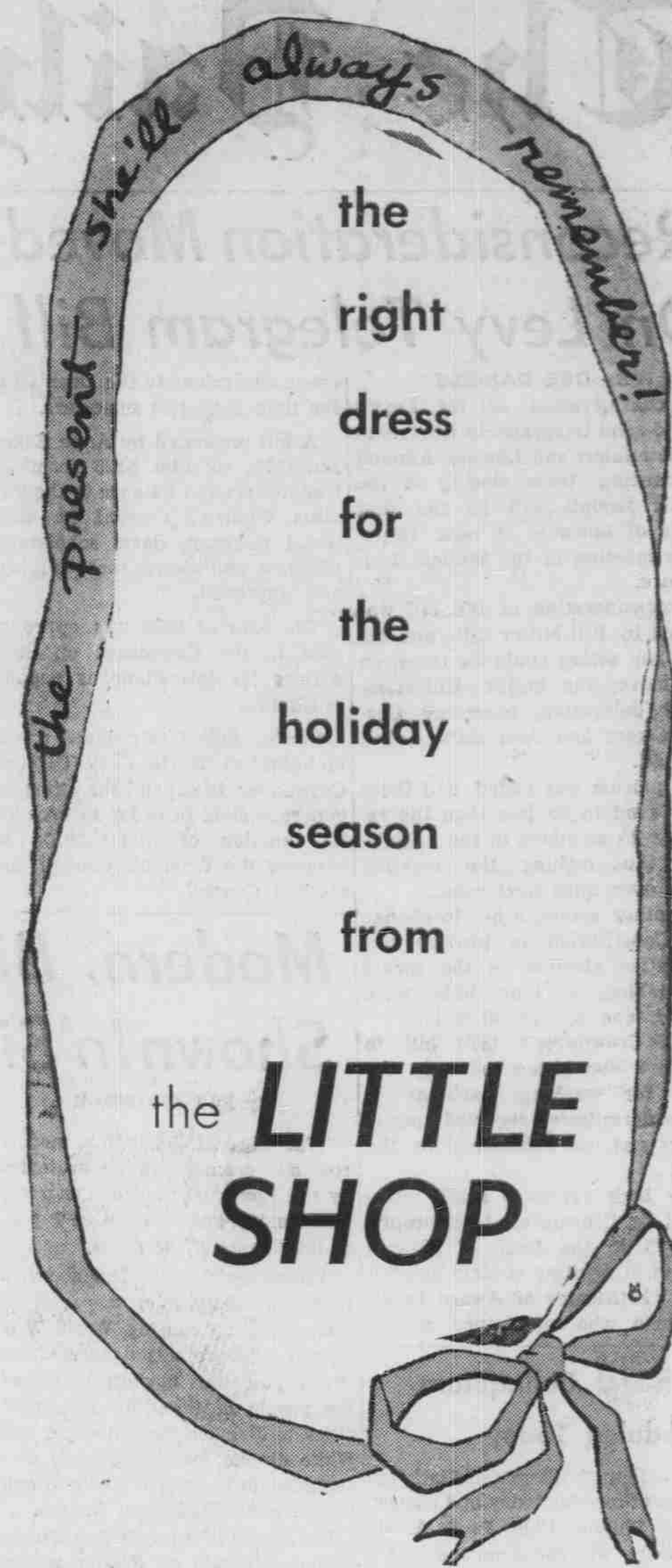
