

Rev. Jordan Addresses Community Church Sun.

The Rev. Clarence Jordan will be guest speaker at the regular Sunday morning worship service of the Chapel Hill Community Church Sunday. The service will be at 11 a.m. in Hill Music Hall.

The Rev. Jordan founded the Koinonia Community in Americus, Ga., 16 years ago.

This was an attempt to create a truly Christian community of committed souls, pacifists, men and women of all races, and a community of common property ownership.

He founded the community on 500 run-down acres of farm land, and introduced progressive farming techniques to the farmers of the region and was able to raise the standard of living of the entire area.

Racial tension flared and buildings of the community were bombed and many installations completely destroyed shortly after the Supreme Court decision.

The farm had to be converted to a pecan processing plant to supply a livelihood for its members because all forms of credit were cut off and insurances were cancelled.

The Rev. Jordan was born in Talbotton, Ga., and educated in the public schools of Talbot Co. He graduated from the University of Georgia with a B.S. in agriculture.

He entered the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky., receiving his Th.M. in May 1936.
