 city planning offices to see that a schedule has been established of new fraternities and sororities to come here and help meet enrollment increases.  
 Smith then turned to the subject of discriminatory clauses in fraternities and sororities.  
 "I can only say that I am unalterably opposed to discrimination on basis of color, race, or creed on

any ground," he commented, "and that my every effort would be toward removing any hint of discrimination on this campus.  
 However, he pointed out that, as president, his authority would be limited, if existent at all, to deal with this matter. He stated that this decision is up to the fraternities, sororities and the administration of the University.
