GOP National Committeeman Discusses European Trip

Mr. Erwin Porterfield, National Committeeman for the North Carolina Federation of Young Republicans, was the distinguished speaker last night at the Young Republican Club's "Get Acquainted Meeting."

Porterfield was a member of the twenty member delegation comprised of ten Republicans and ten Democrats that recently made a trip to some of the Nato countries of Europe. Last night, he gave his impressions of that trip.

It was surprising to learn, he said, that Europe had been rebuilt to such a high degree. Today, West Germany is booming, and in spite of the fact that 25 percent of the present population is refugee, "there is still a need for more people to fill the employment needs. There is no unemployment in West Germany." Because of situations like this all over Europe, Porterfield feels that there is no need for foreign aid in that part of the world.

Plans for a common monetary system in Europe within about 3 1/2 years, and a United States of Europe in 5 years illustrate a new unity among Europeans. Porterfield explained that this is probably "mainly due to the Russian threat."

This may be impeded by the growing nationalism in France however.
