Senior Joe Friedberg was acquitted last night of violating the Honor Code by seeing a Business Administration quiz prior to its being given.

The jury deliberated for forty-five minutes before reaching its verdict. The trial was begun last Thursday but was postponed due to lack of witnesses. Friedberg had no statement after the verdict was announced, although defense counsel Norman B. Smith commented that "his faith in the jury system was reaffirmed by the verdict."
