

Carolina Hands Wake Forest First Conference Loss, 62-59

Tar Heels Avenge Deacon Win In Dixie Classic Title Tilt

GREENSBORO — Carolina's revenge-minded Tar Heels bought the satisfaction they were looking for last night with a heart stopping 62-59 victory over Wake Forest here. This was the get even match for Carolina which was still smarting from a 53-50 loss to the Deacons in the finals of the Dixie Classic.

All five starters were superb in the Tar Heels victory, but it was a pair of clutch three-point plays near the end by Lee Shaffer and York Larese that held the Deacons off.

Carolina held a shaky four-point lead with 2:38 to go when Larese, voted the game's outstanding player, came out of a mass of Deacons under the goal and banked in a magnificent fall-away shot. Len Chappell fouled him and York converted to stretch it to 54-47.

Wake Forest, however, would not quit. Ray Stanley fouled out a half minute later and Wake ran it up to 56-53 with 1:25 remaining.

Harvey Salz sank two foul shots, but Dave Budd came right back with a lay in and it was 58-55 with 1:10 left.

When the clock showed forty-one seconds to go, sub Tommy McCoy shaved the Tar Heels lead to 58-57 with a pair of charity tosses.

But it was only twelve seconds later that Shaffer came through. He took a pass near the foul circle, broke for the goal and laid it in. Big Lee was also fouled on the play and calmly sank his free throw amidst a futile Wake chant of "Go-Deacons-Go!"

Charlie Forte's jumper ten seconds from the end made it 62-59 and the Tar Heels had a three point victory in exchange for the previous three point loss to the Deacons in Raleigh.

Wake jumped to a quick 8-0 lead in the first three minutes and the partisan Deacon crowd was howling. Larese finally broke the spell for Carolina at the 16:54 mark with a jumper and Salz followed a minute later from the outside to make it 8-4.

At the point Deacons coach Bones McKinney called for the slow-down, but it backfired. Salz slapped the ball away from George Ritchie and laid it in to give the Heels their first lead at 14-13.

With 1:40 remaining Shaffer to charge and threw in a jump shot, a hook, and two foul shots in the remaining time. This sent Carolina to the dressing room enjoying a 31-27 margin.

Larese, who asked Coach Frank McGuire before the game for the job, covered Packer all night like a blanket. The little fellow scored five points the first half and that was his some total for the evening.

Larese and Salz led the offensive show for the Tar Heels with 20 and 19 respectively. Shaffer added 13. Ritchie paced Wake Forest with 13 and Budd dropped 11.

Carolina sank 20 of 44 from the floor for a great 45.5 per cent Wake hit 20 of 52 for 38.5 per cent.

Deaclets Beat Frosh, 83-54

GREENSBORO — Wake Forest's hot-handed freshmen team combined a blistering second half attack with alert ball handling to defeat the out-manned Carolina frosh 83-54 here last night.

Paced by the brilliant shooting and play making of guard Al Koehler the Deaclets turned a 37-31 half-time lead into a second half rout, as two Carolina men fouled out and the other starters warmed the bench.

Carolina grabbed an early lead which it held until midway in the first half when the Deaclets took over the lead that they never relinquished.

They were aided considerably by a sloppy exhibition of ball handling on the part of the Tar Babies and the inability of the Carolina frosh under the boards.

Koehler led both teams in scoring with 24 points, and was credited with numerous assists in the second half runaway. He was followed by forwards Gene Jackson and Ted Zawacki with 18 and 17 points respectively.

The Tar Babies could put only one man, Larry Brown, in double figures. He had only thirteen points, eight below his average. Dieter Krause, who held a 22 point mark before gametime, could net only nine.

Carolina drew first blood as Brown and Krause hit on successive field goals while Wake Forest was unable to score until the 15:48 mark when the score stood 6-1.

The Tar Babies had their largest lead of the game at 14-43 when Brown hit a set for a 10-3 Tar Baby lead then the Deaclets began to find the range and took a 16-14 lead when Jackson got two foul shots with eleven minutes left. The teams traded baskets until the half with Wake holding a 37-31 intermission lead.

The Deaclets began the second stanza at a blistering pace and never let up. The writing was on the wall when Carolina's center Richard Vinroot fouled out with 15:52 left in the half, and he was followed by Marty Conlon at the 10:40 mark.

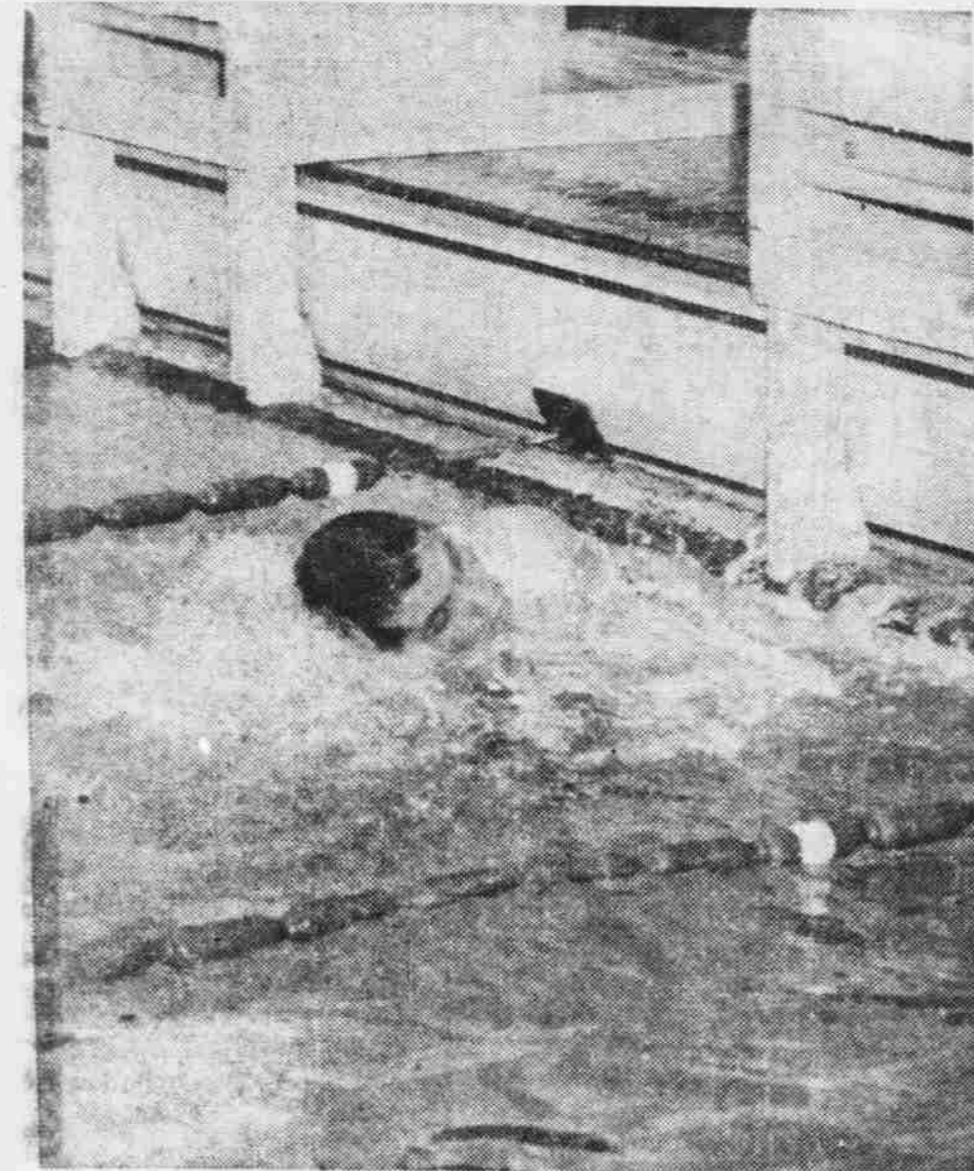

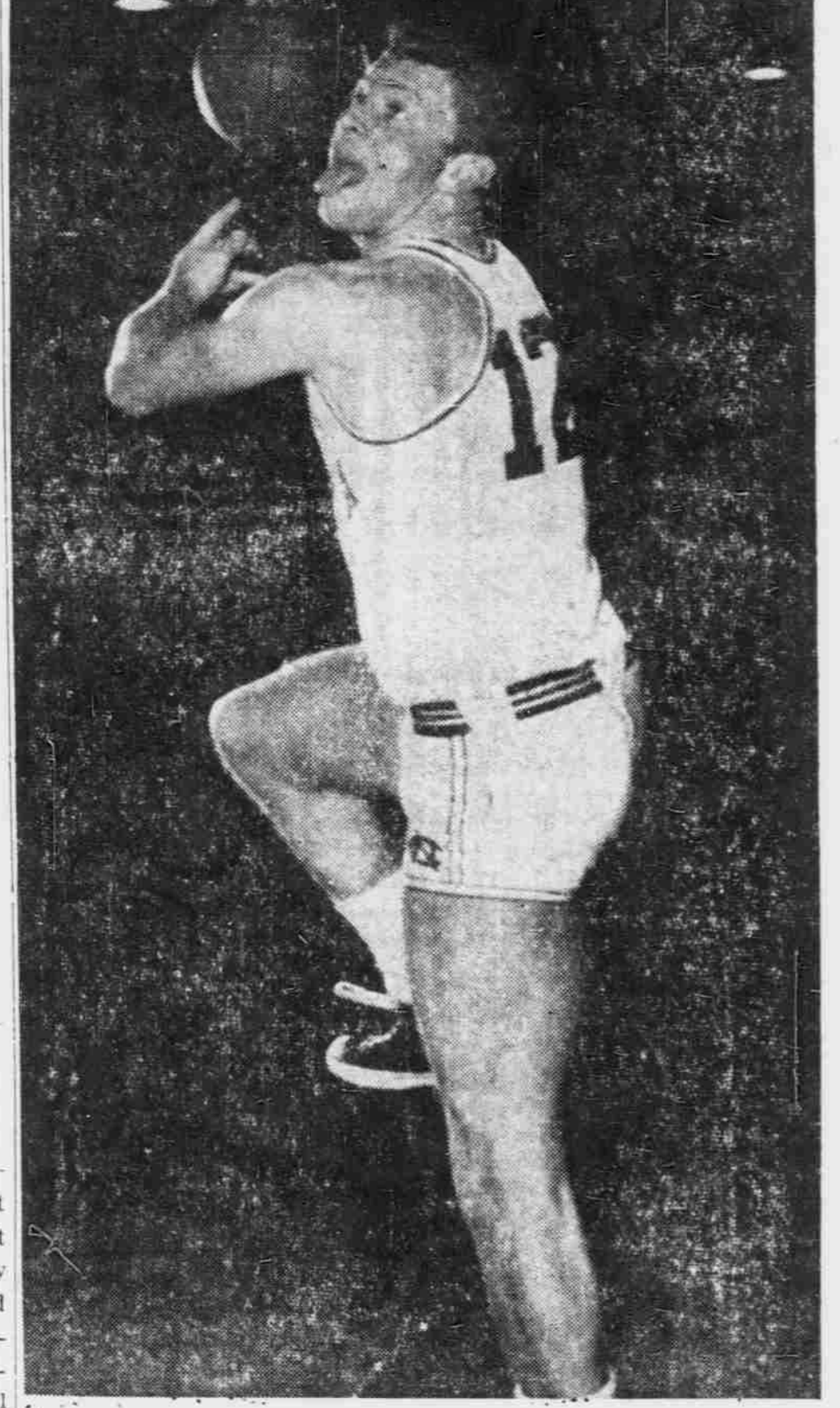

Swimmers Sink Virginia For Sixth Straight Win

Carolina's varsity swimming team romped to victory in every event yesterday afternoon at Bowman Gray Pool as it soundly thrashed Virginia 77-18 for its sixth straight win of the year.

While their elders were taking care of the Cavaliers, the Tar Heel freshmen worked over Greensboro High School 61-16 to register their second victory of the season.

The varsity had two double winners in captain Harry Bloom and sophomore Bobby Briggs. Bloom, who copped the 250 and 500 freestyle races, set a school record in the 500 with a time of 5:09.0.

In the freshman meet breast-stroker Maurice Davison set a new mark in the 100 with a time of 1:09.6 to break the old record of 1:10.5.

The Tar Heels have two more meets next week against East Carolina and Wake Forest before breaking off for exams. Dick Jamerson's frosh crew is even more active as they will tangle with East Carolina, Myers Park, and Staunton Military Academy before the semester closes.

Dixie Classic Committee Adds Villanova To List

RALEIGH, (AP) — Villanova was added Saturday to the list of out-of-state entries in this year's Dixie Basketball Classic at North Carolina State College.
