

Carolina Crushes Maryland By 17 Points, 81-64

Tar Heels Secure Tenth Win Against League Competition

With Doug Moe in the driver's seat, Carolina got back on the road last night and ran down Maryland 81-64 to the complete satisfaction of 4,600 Tar Heel fans who witnessed the contest in Woollen Gym.

For the fourth straight game the junior forward hit for over 20 points. This time his total was 25. Playing in the pivot against the Terps man-to-man defense, Moe got sixteen of his points in the last half, most of these on lay ups and foul shots.

The winners upped their ACC record to 10-2 with the victory and remain in contention to tie Wake Forest at 12-2 for top spot in the conference's final standings.

Salz Sidelined

Playing without the services of captain Harvey Salz who sustained a rib injury in the South Carolina game, Coach Frank McGuire's crew experienced some anxious moments in the second half as the Terps tied up the contest at 36-36 before falling to the Tar Heels last half rally, a quality that has been sorely missed over the past three games.

Besides Moe, the Tar Heels had three other players in double figures. Lee Shaffer topped his trio with 14 and was followed by Ray Stanley and Jim Donohue who both had 11.

Using a zone on defense Carolina completely bottled up Maryland's center Al Bunge who went into the fray as the leading scorer in the conference. Hounded continually by Stanley, Donohue, Moe, and Shaffer, the Terp center could manage only five points for the entire evening, and he got all of these in the first half.

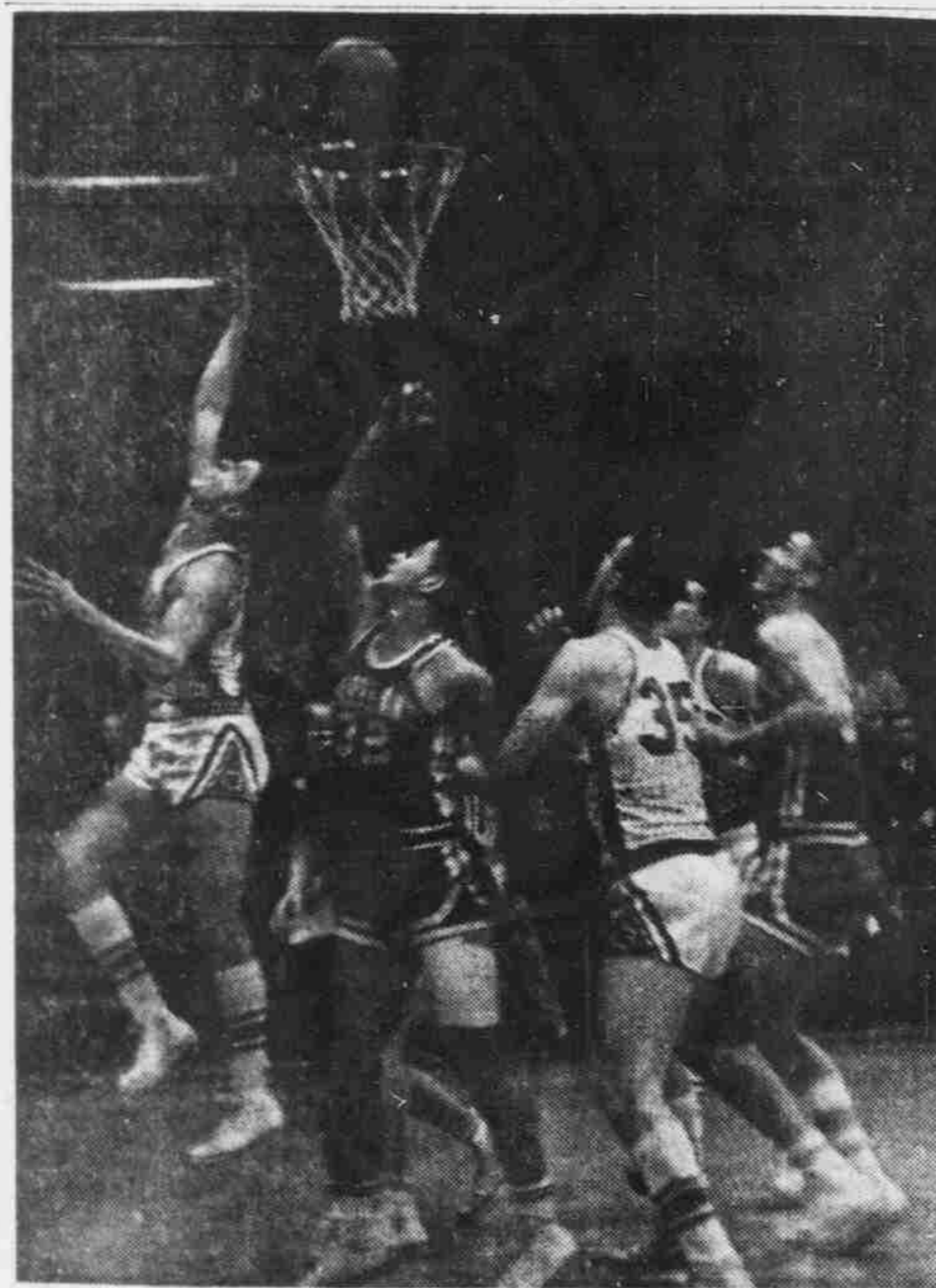

Tar Babies Beaten On Last Second Shot

George Lehmann, a King Midas with a basketball, whipped a pass to his big center, Bob Weichmann, who sank a layup with only two seconds left in the game to give Campbell Junior College a comeback 64-63 victory over the Carolina freshmen here last night.

Weichmann's game-winning effort came after the Tar Babies' Marty Conlon had missed two vital free throw attempts with only 12 seconds showing on the clock.

Lehmann, after a first half in which he could only sink 4 of 11 shots from the floor, came back to personally wipe out a 12 point Tar Baby lead and finally send the Camels ahead at the 9:06 mark.

Tar Babies Lead

Carolina, behind 25-24 at intermission, came out fast after the rest period on some fine shooting by Conlon and guard Larry Brown. With over seven and a half minutes gone and the Tar Babies enjoying a 43-31 margin, Lehmann turned red-hot and tied 10 of Campbell's next 16 points on three long jump shots and two driving hooks. His jumper at 9:06 put the Camels ahead 47-45.

The 6-2 Palmyra, N. J. product continued his great shooting and shot Campbell into a seven point lead, 56-49, with 6:08 left to play. The Tar Babies weren't out of it yet, however, finally overtaking them on Roland Parker's two charity tosses with 38 seconds left for a 63-62 lead.

Conlon Misses

It was evident that the last shot was going to be given to Lehmann at this point, but Holland lost the ball in the forecourt and Conlon was promptly fouled as the Tar Babies reached the other end of the court. Both shots hit the back rim and Campbell had the ball with 12 seconds separating it from a 63-62 loss.

With all eyes on Lehmann, the crafty guard was double-teamed in the backcourt by Sonny Smith and Joe Lee, but Lehmann spied Weichmann under the goal and it was all over.

Bunge Tops ACC Scoring List

GREENSBORO (AP)—Maryland's Al Bunge is back in the driver's seat in the Atlantic Coast Conference's individual point-making race.

But no fewer than seven challengers have a reasonable mathematical chance to overtake or pass him before the final tabulations are made.

Bunge's average, according to ACC Service Bureau figures through games of last Saturday night, is now 17.5 points a game. But less than 2 points a game separates him from North Carolina's York Larese, No. 8 scorer at 15.8 points a game.

Six Challengers

In between are sophomore Art Whisnaut of South Carolina 17.3 points a game, Paul Adams of Virginia 17.2, Lee Shaffer of North Carolina 17.1, sophomore Chippy Patterson of Clemson 16.9, sophomore Len Chappel of Wake Forest 16.7, Mike Callahan of South Carolina 15.9.

Adkins and Shaffer have been previous leaders, and all have shown the ability to close such a small gap in a short spurt.

Actually, Doug Moe of North Carolina has a better average than all of the top men, 17.6 points a game, but he has played in less than half of his team's games and is not eligible at this time.

May Go To Playoffs

It is possible that even next week's championship tournament will not produce a clear-cut champion. It could take the NCAA playoffs to settle the issue conclusively. Playoff performance counts in season scoring in accordance with NCAA regulations. Maryland's Paul Jelus, a talented sophomore, is a new challenger
