

Keeping Score

You've got to hand it to Vic Bunas and his Duke Blue Devils. It's all history now, but somehow it just doesn't figure how a fumbling, stumbling outfit like the Blue Devils were on many occasions could turn into the Atlantic Coast Conference Champions overnight.

It was a tremendous job accomplished with the contrary to many opinions' usual amount of luck. Duke played terrific basketball when it had to, and simply outplayed its three opponents on the way to the title. When considering the action of the past weekend it's certainly evident no team deserves to go to the national tournament any more than the Blue Devils.

But even more significant is the fact that three nights don't make a basketball season. And how about a couple of other tremendous jobs turned in by the Tar Heel's Frank McGuire and Wake Forest's Bones McKinney that have suddenly come to a sliding, screening stop . . . ?

These two had their teams primed and ready for the Devils on five different occasions, Carolina winning three and the Deacons two by a combined point margin of 110 points. Unfortunately, no one knew then that Duke was building a psychological bomb destined to explode come tournament time . . .

There's no reward for Wake's fine 21-7 overall record and Carolina's impressive 18-6 slate simply because they had to participate in this financial balloon called the conference tournament. After all, 49,000 people paying \$2.50 per ticket evidently justify taking the risk that the ACC could send its eighth place finisher to the NCAA playoffs.

What's more important, anyway, a few dollars in the right pockets or giving the No. 1 team a chance to bring back the national championship to the ACC? When will we get a chance to answer?

Everett Case, the ageless State pilot, has been elected president of the ACC coaches, and will be able to swing a lot of weight in breaking the conference's hands-off policy with the National Invitational Tournament.

On his TV show Sunday night, Case declared that teams from the ACC ought to be able to participate in the NIT, citing the fact that both Carolina and Wake Forest would have gone this year. Only the NCAA championship tops the NIT title in prestige.

It was gratifying to see the conference executives overrule Commissioner Jim Weaver's declaration that Wake's Dave Budd could not play against Duke for his "fighting" in the State battle.

Budd seems to be lying down more that standing up in the course of many a game, a fact that should commend his aggressiveness rather than condemn it. The 6-6 senior is well equipped to defend himself, but many a scrap has been centered around him in which he had no choice but to fight back.

When Dave was introduced before the start of the championship game, fans from all corners told him they knew he wasn't a "bad boy" after all—a full two-minute ovation carried the message.

The ACC player-of-the-year will be selected this week by the sports-writers and the voting for the honor should be interesting.

If anyone other than Lee Shaffer wins though, I, for one, will toss the typewriter in the closet and venture into another profession.

SUGAR BOWL RETURNS
NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Louisiana State and Mississippi each received an all-time high check for \$165,000 for the 1960 Sugar Bowl football game, bowl president George Schneider said Monday.

Mississippi, ranked second in the final Associated Press poll of the 1959 season, blanked third ranked LSU 21-0 before a full house of 83,000 on New Year's Day.

NCAA Playoff Get Started With Six Contests Tonight

California's defense-minded Bears open defense of their national collegiate NCAA basketball championship Tuesday night, meeting Idaho State in a regional game at San Francisco.

The game highlights regional activity which also includes three games at New York's Madison Square Garden and two at Lexington, Ky.

Here is the Tuesday schedule:

 New York University 19-3 vs. Connecticut 17-8; West Virginia 24-4 vs. Navy 16-5; Duke 13-10 vs. Princeton 15-8.
 At Lexington, Ky.:

 At San Francisco:
 California 24-1 vs. Idaho State 21-4.

Wednesday Action
 In another preliminary game for the Far West, New Mexico State 19-6, the Border champion, plays Oregon 17-9, an at-large representative, at Corvallis, Ore., on Wednesday.

Winners of these games move into the second round of the regional eliminations, which are scheduled Friday and Saturday at the following points: Charlotte, Louisville, Manhattan, Kans., and Seattle.

The single survivors from each of these regional centers qualify for the semifinals and finals at San Francisco March 18-19.

California Favored
 California, with a defense which has limited foes to an average of 48.2 points a game, is favored to come through its Pacific Coast preliminary tests and make a strong bid for its second straight championship.

Chief obstacles are Cincinnati 24-1, the Missouri Valley champion and No. 1 in the Associated Press poll; Ohio State 21-3, the Big Ten champion, and West Virginia 24-4, Southern Conference winner and runnerup last year.

Most of the NCAA 25-team field is filled. Others include Utah 24-1, Skyline Conference; Georgia Tech 21-5, Southeastern Conference; Texas 18-6, Southwest Conference; and St. Joseph's, Pa. NIT Starts

The National Invitation Tournament at Madison Square Garden opens Thursday with Villanova 19-5, playing Detroit 20-6, and Providence 21-4 meeting Memphis State 17-4.

Other teams in the NIT are Bradley 24-2, Utah State 22-5, St. John's 17-7, St. Louis 18-7, Holy Cross 20-5, St. Bonaventure 19-3, Dayton 20-6 and Temple 17-8.

The NCAA small college division quarter-finalists move to Evansville, Ind., Wednesday to settle that championship. The pairings are: St. Michaels Vt. vs. Kentucky Wesleyan, American University vs. Evansville College, Wheaton vs. Chapman and Cornell Iowa vs. Kirksville.

EASTERN REGIONAL TICKETS
CHARLOTTE (AP)—About 2,300 tickets are available for the Friday and Saturday night's NCAA Eastern regional basketball tournament at the Charlotte Coliseum.

Paul Buck, Coliseum manager reported Monday that over 9,000 tickets have been sold for each of the twin bills at the 11,666-seat Coliseum. The remainder are on sale only at the Coliseum.

McKinney Selected As ACC Coach Of The Year

He receives the annual Gerry Gerard Award offered by the writers' group.

McKinney directed Wake Forest to a 21-7 record in his third season as head coach. The Demon Deacons won the Dixie Classic crown and tied with North Carolina for first place in the regular-season ACC standings. Each had 12-2 loop marks.

Beateu By Duke
 McKinney's cagers defeated Clemson and North Carolina State in the ACC championship tournament, but were upset 63-59 by Duke in the finals.

During the regular schedule, however, Wake Forest had stopped the champion Blue Devils by margins of 17 and 19 points.

Three veteran seniors were joined by sophomores Billy Packer and big Len Chappell to help mold the Deacons into a power-house. "It takes the horses," McKinney has said often, "and this year I got 'em."

McKinney, 6-6 stringbean whose antics on the bench has made him a familiar figure to Wake Forest crowds, first gained basketball prominence on the Durham High School team which won 69 straight 1938, 39 and 40. He entered N.C. State and was the Southern Conference's leading scorer in his sophomore year.

McKinney was ordained a Baptist minister after a tour in the Army, a year of stardom on the 1946 North Carolina team and a brief stint as a professional cager and coach of the Washington Caps.

In the voting, McKinney, got 34 votes. Next was Vic Bunas of Duke, selected by 26 voters.

Duke Game On TV
CHARLOTTE (AP)—Several North Carolina television stations will carry the Duke-Princeton game in the NCAA basketball tournament at New York Tuesday night.

The game, last of a tripleheader, will start between 9 and 9:30 p.m., depending on the finish of the two earlier contests.

Connecticut and New York University open the program at 6 o'clock, with Navy and West Virginia scheduled to follow at 7:30.

Stations carrying the telecast include WNCN, Greenville; WFMV-TV, Greensboro; WBT, Charlotte; WECT, Wilmington; WTVD, Durham.

Sophomores Top Voting For All-Big Ten Five

CHICAGO (AP)—Sophomores Jerry Lucas of Ohio State and Terry Dischinger of Purdue were the only unanimous choices for the 1960 All-Big Ten basketball team named Monday by the Associated Press.

Also making the first five were Horace Walker of Michigan State, Walt Bellamy of Indiana and Ron Johnson of Minnesota.

Lucas, already named to the AP's All-America team, led Ohio State to the Big Ten title and Dischinger topped all Big Ten scorers.

The Purdue flash finished with 38.4 points in 14 games for a 27.4 average. Lucas was second with 36.2 points and a 25.8 average.

Ballamy, Indiana's 6-10 1/2 pivot-man from New Bern, N.C., was the only repeater from last year's team and missed being an unanimous choice by one ballot. Walker also was named on all but one ballot of AP writers in the Big Ten area. Johnson missed by two. One oddity does arise—all five played the pivot for their respective teams.

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Shaffer And Larese Chosen On All-ACC Tournament Team

RALEIGH, March 7 (AP)—Duke and North Carolina placed two players each and Wake Forest one on the All-Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament basketball team announced Monday.

Big Len Chappell, 6-8, 240-pound Wake Forest Sophomore, was the only unanimous choice on the team selected by the Atlantic Coast Sports Writers Assn. Fifty-two ballots were cast.

Other Selections
 Rounding out the first team are Duke's Doug Kistler and Howard Hurt and North Carolina's Lee Shaffer and York Larese.

Duke's Blue Devils knocked over South Carolina in the opening round and then upset co-favorites North Carolina and Wake Forest on successive nights to win the tournament.

Chappell received a maximum of 104 points. Shaffer had 102 points based on two points for first place and one for second. Hurt was third with 91, Kistler received 90 and Larese 84. Next came Duke's Carroll Younklin with 72.

Leading Scorer
 Chappell pulled down 18 rebounds and scored 66 points in the three games. Hurt and Kistler each scored 62 points and got 27 rebounds. Larese had a two-game total of 53 points and Shaffer 50.

Wake Forest's Dave Budd got 49 points in the balloting, Duke's Johnny Frye 39, and Bob DiStefano of North Carolina State and Paul Adkins of Virginia 19 each.
