## Silent German Movie 'Last Laugh' Will Be Shown To Film Society

The silent German masterpiece portrays the downfall of a hotel commissionaire, his pride and dignity destroyed by the stigma of old age.

The skillful use of camera and lighting by Karl Freund has earned this film world-wide acclaim.

Although no words are spoken a continuity is preserved throughout the story. Film director and historian Paul Rotha has called it "Cine fiction in its purest form."

Opening Sunday night's program will be a one-reel excerpt from the silent film version of "Hamlet," starring the renowned Danish actress Asta Nielsen. Miss Nielsen is the only woman to attempt the role of Hamlet on stage or screen.

# Carolina Alumnus Opens Art Show In New York Recently

Edward Higgins, New York sculptor who got his training at the UNC Art Department, opened a one-man show at the Castelli Galleries on 77th street in New York City recently.

A sculptor in iron and in ceramics, Higgins will show some of his latest works, according to the art editor of the New York Times.

In Chapel Hill, Higgins studied under Prof. Robert Howard. Higgins is considered one of the best artists and perhaps the most outstanding student of sculpture to be graduated here. He received his degree in 1954.

With emphasis on abstract sculpture, Higgins had sold a number of his works, so that now he is able to devote his full time to work in his studio in New York.

He sold "The Outside of a Sokli" to the New York Museum of Fine Arts last year. A work in iron, "The Torso" was sold this year to a wealthy family in the Philippines.

He has several objects in the Modern Art Show now on tour with current showing in St. Louis and later in Boston. This summer he will have two articles of sculpture in the Bernard Galleries in Paris.

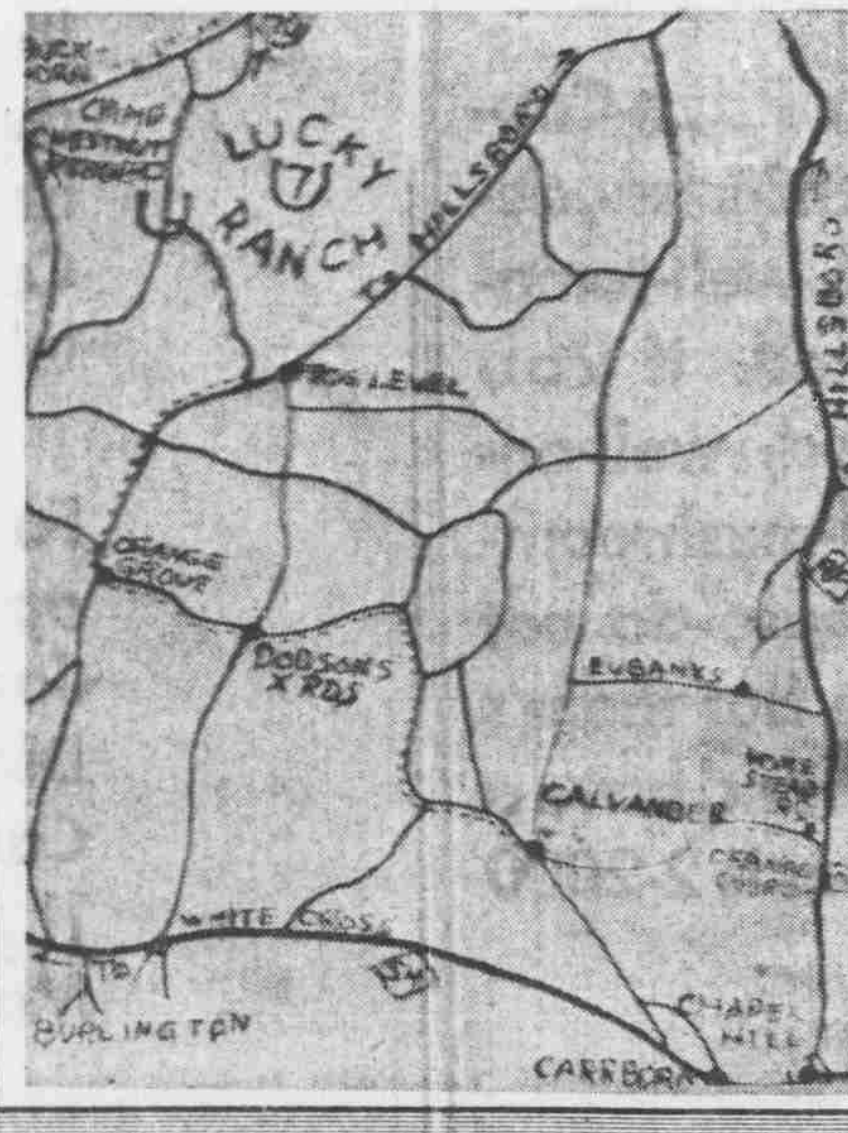
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## 7 Carolina Students Receive NFS Stipends For Next School Year

Seven UNC students received National Science Foundation fellowships for the next academic year recently.

Most of the stipends are worth \$2200 and are awarded over a 12 months period. Others are valued at \$1650 for 9 months.

The fellowships were awarded to Frank Ivy Carrol, chemistry; Eugene Philip Howrey, economics; Wallace Craft Fallaw, geology and geography; Frederick W. Blackwell, mathematics; John H. Rugheimer and George D. Thaxton, physics.

Andrew W. Loven of the chemistry department will attend summer school here on a NSF summer fellowship for graduate teachers. He will receive \$900.

Fellowships were awarded for academic achievement, scores on Graduate Records Examinations and on recommendations of professors.
